Attention is also given to spray injury and Winter injury: These diseases are described and recon tions for control given. A spray calendar for pears is also included.

In order to get more definite data on the question of growing alfalfa, the extension division of the Agriculture College is putting out with farmers, in different parts of the State, test plots of seed from almost every large producing State, as well as Turkestan, South America and Russia. Steps Taken By Authorities. The dry of "mad dog" startled residents las Sunday when a stray hound appeared uptown and as it ran along the streets, picked quarrels with other dogs, biting several. Constable Sam Taylor, Moses Harbert, Jr., and Walter Bonsall took after the dog with shotguns and after several attempts finally killed bim. nday the head of the dog was cut off and taken to the Pennsylvania State Livestock Senitary Board, where it was examined by J. 




