Idieness of prisoners in the County Jail and their close confinement is deplored by Mr. C. and Prison Reform Association, who in recommendations made for reforming the present system, declares inmates of this institution should have exercise and employment. Mr. ce and says Atlantic City should take care of its prisoners by means of a workhouse. Work for prisopers on the county farm at Northfield is suggested among other things, all of which will be submitted to the Board of bolders for consideration.



The celery bed should receive frequent cultiration, but this cultivation should be shallow, specially near the plants, as colory is a surhee feeding plant. If the plants do not have a thrifty appearance, it may be advisable to rake a little nitrate of soda or chicken manure into the soil to give them a quick growth.

Colory needs an abus supply of moisture in the soil for its best dereloppitent. Nothing infures its quality so surely as being checked in growth. There are times in even a wet season when water can be applied advantageously to this crop.

When the celery is almost half grown, th soil may be gradually worked up to the plants to encourage an upright instead of a sprawling growth. Never pull soil up to the plants while the celery is damp with dew, and at all times be careful not to get dirt down into the

In most cases, if not all, after the dewberrie are picked there is nothing done with the petch until the following Spring. This is a great mistake, for, as the asparagus bed after cutting needs plenty of fertilizer and good care to produce healthy, strong canes for the coming year, so the dewberry needs care to pro healthy, strong vines to bear the crop for the next year.

Last Spring, after receiving a number calls from the farmers to inspect their dewberry fields to tell them why they had so much dying of the vines and so many poor vine left to hear fruit the Denegostrator took th tter up with Dr. Cook, State Plant Patho gist, and inspected a number of fields, Anding a great many vines infacted with "Anthrac

The following is the care recommended to the dewberry fields, especially fields left with the intention of picking from the coming year, After the dewberries are picked, or sometime In August or September, go over the patch and cut out all the vines that bore fruit this yearthe berry growers will find it is much easie to clean out the old vines just after they have fluished picking than if they wait until the following Spring. After the bearing vines are aned out the new vines should be thou oughly sprayed with Bordeaux mixture 5-5-50. The cutting out of the old vines will not only destroy a large percentage of the anthracnos but will give the young vines a much better
