

An Expert's Testimony

A telephone man-one whose twenty years of experience qualifies him to speakhas said that over half of the service difficulties of to-day would be prevented if persons would speak directly into the transmitter, with the lips half an inch from the mouth-piece, and speak slowly and distinctly in a moderate tone of voice, particularly when giving numbers to the operator.

The telephone mouthpiece has been designed to catch sound and convey it to the mechanism of the transmitter. The present shape has been determined to be the best; but the best is not sufficient if numbers are whispered or shouted, from lips a foot away or turned at right angles to the telephone.
