## EXEMPTION CLAIMS ARE PENDING

BOARD TO SIT NEXT WEEK TO DECIDE DEPENDENCIES

## ONE MAN POSTED AS DESERTER

FAILED TO RESPOND TO ROLL CALL WHEN ORDERED

Examinations for the first draft have been concluded in Atlantic County, 1,200 registrants having been called from which 244 have been selected for service to date. This number will likely be brought up to 300 next week when the Exemption Board passes on claims.

The county's quota is 300 and the others accepted will be held as alternates to fill the places as they are needed.

Exemption claims are being considered by the District Board of Exemption from military service. The county's quota will not be considered filled until 304 men are actually enrolled in camp.

Nine men have been sent to Camp Dix this week and two more will go to-day. No official orders have been received as to when others will go, but reports place the number at 40 percent on September 15 and the remainder in October.

One man called this week, Herman Kraus, of Hamilton, who recently left for New York, did not respond to roll call and has been posted as a deserter, his name having been turned in to the Federal authorities and the New York police with instructions to arrest him and turn him over to the nearest military authorities for court martial. He was to have gone to Camp Dix Thursday, William G. Lambert, of this place, was sent in his place as he had requested the Board to send him at the first opportunity.

A session of the Exemption Board will be held tomorrow during the coming week and this will conclude the work of the Board for the present, with the exception of calling the men and sending them to camp. No official word has been received since a second draft and another 500,000 are called out by the government, there will not be enough registrants left to fill another quota unless those who have turned 21 since June 5 are registered on the government change its ruling in regard to married men.

Modified rulings in regard to flat feet, which are under consideration, if adopted will cause a great many who have been rejected on this ground to be recalled. The present rule is strict and requires the physicians to discharge flat footed men. There are many who have been thus discharged, however, who are otherwise physically perfect, some of them athletes and men who are probably entitled to a great many others who have been accepted. These army men believe, should be drafted and not rejected unless weakness actually develops under training.

## BIG SWIMMING EVENTS IN WATERS OF LENAPE

CHAMPS FROM ALL SECTIONS HERE FOR AQUATIC CLUB MEET

Lake Lenape's placid bosom will be buffeted this afternoon by several of the best swimmers in the country and some national records may be broken in the series of races scheduled, under the auspices of the Atlantic City Aquatic Club.

Promptly at four o'clock President Frederick Dabner of the station, A. A. W. will pull the trigger to start off the first half-mile race. This will be swum over a furious course, the swimmers going over the course four times.

After this there will be half-mile championship race for girls, a duck chase and other exciting contests and finally the third annual distance swim for the Cochran trophy.

Among the entries of note are Leo Global, of New York; Ed. J. J. record holder, John Miller, of Detroit; Walter, of Chicago; Tomlinson, of Philadelphia and Maga, of Camden, in addition to members of the Aquatic Club. There will be no charge for viewing the races from any section of the park.

## RISK ELEVEN IN THOUSAND

That is the Chance Every Soldier Has of Being Killed in Action.

The Committee on Public Information has obtained from official sources the most accurate figures available, and the results are startling in relation to casualties on the Western front. These figures, taken when the casualties were grouped in proportion to mobilized strength and combined with the highest proportion of deaths, show losses due to death from wounds and killed in action to be approximately 11 in every 1,000 of mobilized strength.

According to the figures presented by the French High Commanding General to the Secretary of War, the high proportion of casualties in the French Army was reached early in the war—84 per cent of the mobilized strength, or 84 men in every 1,000 who were sent to the front.

The military experts in this country agree that the killed in action and died of wounds have never at any time in this war exceeded 30 percent of the total casualties. This gives a figure of 10.8 mobilized from these losses in every 1,000 mobilized strength, or practically 11 men killed in action or died of wounds for every 1,000 men with the colors.

Hits Prussian Sympathizers

Any sympathetic talk for Germany must be firmly suppressed, the first step in sympathy has passed. This country must be solid united and prove to Germany that we will not tolerate pro-German expressions of sympathy in the United States.

What do those persons expect to gain by siding with Germany, a country they evidently were glad to leave, to escape compulsory military? They came to this country and, after working off their bonny, they turn against her in the time of need and betray their allegiance to the land they had foresworn.

Fortunately, the majority of German-Americans are loyal to the land of their adoption, the real German sympathizers being decidedly in the minority, but still of sufficient numbers to create a certain amount of turmoil and distraction, thus giving Germany a false idea of our actual help.

When the German people realize we are a united nation and are in this war to win then will come the end of the war. Germany cannot win this war with America in it against her. It is impossible for one nation to rule the world.—K. Ambassador James W. Gerard.

An Expert's Testimony A telephone man—one whose twenty years of experience qualifies him to speak—has said that over half of the service difficulties of to-day would be prevented if persons would speak directly into the transmitter, with the lips half an inch from the mouth-piece, and speak slowly and distinctly in a moderate tone of voice, particularly when giving numbers to the operator. The telephone mouthpiece has been designed to catch sound and convey it to the mechanism of the transmitter. The present shape has been determined to be the best; but the best is not sufficient if numbers are whispered or shouted, from lips a foot away or turned at right angles to the telephone.
