SUBAR HILL CHANGE APPROVED

Freeholders May Take Over New Detective Bills Not Yet Paid-Board Met At Asylum And En-Session.

In connection with the survey for the pro posed relocation of Main Street at Sugar Hill, eliminating three grade crossings, the Board of Chosen Prestiolders voted Wednesday last to make a survey of Main Street to the Downs town Road, with a view to rebuilding the road through the County Capital with some kind of permant pavement. The resolution, assed unanimously, directs the County Engineer to make a survey of the entire improvement which is to be submitted to the State and the West Jersey Hallroad Company, both of which are expected to give substantial aid to the project.

Some time ago Col. E. A. Stephens, State Road Commissioner, went over the Main Street proposition and declared himself favorable to its improvement with State sid, in cluding the rebuilding of the bridges. At a ce with the Freeholders last week Supt. James Buckalew of the ratiroad signified his willingness to aid in the work of eliminating the grade crossings, so it is hoped that early progress will be made on the project.

The Freeholders received another specia detective bill from an outside detective agency, this time for \$900, which with the one for \$4,500 they received but month makes a total of \$5,400 special detective bills now before the Board for its consideration. Ex-Judge C. L. Cole, counsel for the agency, served notice by letter on the Board that unless the bills were paid he would apply for a mandamus. Inasmuch as at their last meeting the Board passed resolution directing the Finance Committee to hold a conference with the Prosecuto regarding extra detective services and this had not been done, owing to the absence of the Prosecutor, the claims were laid over for another month to give the Finance Committee an opportunity to make an investigation.


