SUPREME COURT STAND ON PROSECUTOR'S PAY WILL BE APPEALED

BOARD TO ASK SOLICITOR TO TAKE QUESTION TO ERRORS AND APPEALS

Legislature Has Distinctly Fixed Compensation At \$3,000 And Freeholders Will Support Collector's Contention That This Is The Legal Salary-Moore Asks For \$4,000 a Year.

Following the decision of the Supreme Court anded down Thursday by Justice Garrison, that Prosecutor Charles S. Moore is entitled under the law to a salary of \$4,000 a year. members of the Board of Freeholders of this County declared vesterday that they would ask Bolicitor Enoch A. Highee to carry the matter to the Court of Errors and Appeals, as the law distinctly fixed the salaryat \$3,000, on the ground that the law stands as ensated and cunnot be changed, by a decision, of the Court

contrary to its text. Collector Johnson, guided by the text of the law, claimed, for the sake of settling the mosted question, that under amendments to the State law regulating the pay of Prosecutors in countles bordering on Ocean, the salary was to be \$3,000, except when the population was more than 50,000 and no more than 65,000. By the last census Atlantic County exceeded 65,000. After his salary had been reduced, Prosecutor Moore prought this suit to compel the Collector to pay him \$4,000

Justice Garrison shows in his opinion that by the census of 1905 Atlantic County had a pulation of 50,862, which, under the act of 1906 fixed the compensation of the Prosecutor 0x62.5 ft. East side Portland Ave. North of at \$1,500. In 1998 two amendments were en acted giving an incremed compensation to Prosecutors in counties bordering on the Atlantic Ocean, fixing such compensation at \$5,000 whenever the population of any such ounty was more than 50,000 and not more than 65,500. While general in form these mendments affected Atlantic County Blone. In 1910 the population of Atlantic County had risen to 71,894, or beyond the 65,000 mentioned in the acts of 1998, and this circumstance led to the refusal to pay Moore's salary at the \$4,000 rate upon the ground that the acts of 1908 no longer applied to the Prosecutor of Atlantic

County. It is contended by the Board that they cannot authorize any payment of money contrary o the law made and provided and that if the Prosecutor is entitled to a greater salary than \$1,000 it is the place of the Legislature to change the statute.

GET RID OF MOSQUITOES SChusler's County Extermination Board Has Six Suggestions.

Specific information as to how the resident of Atlantic County may assist in the extermination of the mosquito is given in a circular ssued by the County Mosquito Extermination formulasion, which is being distributed as a preliminary move in a campaign of anti-mos juito education. The bulletin is intended to nform householders us to what they can de ndividually to get rid of the mosquito pest

Blx directions are given, as follows: "Kirst -Get rid of all standing water on you property by ditching it away or filling in. Becond-Bee that there are no tin cans broken dishes, bottles, palls, rain barrels or anything on your premises or in your back yards in which water may collect, "Third-See that there are no wash tubs of palls in your basement, or anything that will

hold water.

"Fourth-See that there is no stagment water in your basement or elevator shaft, so that your house will not be full of mosquiloes, "Firth-See that your garbage can is covered and that your rain barrel is screened, "Bixth-if there is any stagment water any where in your neighborhood which cannot be

every ten days. One city of oil is sufficient for Aftern square feet of surface. These methods will absolutely prevent the breeding of mosquitoes on your premises, will thereby therease the real estate value of your property and rid you of this annoying and dangerous pest. The house mosquito is easily controlled if you will do your part and look

after your own premises,"
