

BOOM PLAN FOR BRIDGE OVER EGG HARBOR BAY

State Road Commissioner Favors Project for Span to Connect Two Counties and Establish New Link

The project for a bridge across the Great Egg Harbor Bay from Bonner's Point to Heedley's Point was born Wednesday by Col. Stevenson, the Road Commissioner of the State, who was present at a meeting of the Cape May Freeholders and the Bridge Committee of the Atlantic County Freeholders, held in G. A. R. Hall, Atlantic City. Col. Stevenson said he believed that the project had been long in the mind of the State, would be ready to stand at least one-third of the cost of the construction of the bridge, and, perhaps, by securing co-operation of the Legislature, one-half of the cost. The Freeholders from both counties were enthusiastic over the announcement and expressed appreciation and approval of the Commissioner's plans.

Col. Stevenson was asked whether or not the Governor was in favor of the building of the project as furthering the completion of the State boulevard.

"I have never been told by the Governor directly that he is in favor of this scheme, but I know that he is in sympathy with improvements of this character," replied the Colonel. "I feel certain that he will approve of the plan of the State paying a portion of the

could toward having the coling Legislature pass a bill that would give the State the right to appropriate money for that purpose."

Judge Higbee, Solicitor of the Atlantic County Board was asked for an expression of his views. He said he was heartily in sympathy with the scheme, for what would benefit one part of the New Jersey coast would help another, and he was certain that the time was near at hand for the building of this bridge to connect Cape May and Atlantic Counties. He felt certain the people coming to the coast would find this the best place to stop, and the bridge would be very glad to have it, and that it would result in mutually benefiting both counties.

He said that it was the first time to his knowledge that the State had ever offered to assume any responsibility for bridge construction, and that care would have to be exerted

Charles Clouting, of the Cape May Boardwalk, said that hundreds of their residents and Summer people would be delighted if they could have the bridge in order that they might be able to run over to Atlantic City to spend evenings on the Boardwalk or at the

most resorts in the Southern part of the State would experience a material growth if this bridge should be constructed.

Director Dougherty, of the Atlantic County Board, presented a resolution, providing for the recommendation that both County Boards at their next meeting, appoint committees, including their respective engineers and solicitors, to confer with the State Road Department in relation to the matter and this was unanimously adopted.
