GARDNER RENOMINATED FOR HIS TENTH TERM

UNANIMOUSLY CHOSEN BY DISTRICT DELEGATES.

Grand Old Man of Atlantic Assured of Sweeping Victory At Polls Next November — His Policies Endorsed By Convention.

At the Congressional Convention of the Second District of New Jersey held Thursday at Cape May, the Hon. John J. Gardner was nominated as Republican candidate for Congressman for his tenth consecutive term. Every vote on the first ballot was for Gardner with the exception of three and a motion to make the vote unanimous was carried with great enthusiasm. Postmaster Harry Bacharach, of Atlantic City, in an able speech that roused intense enthusiasm, placed Congressan Gardner in nomination, lauding his levements for the State and Nation.

Edge, of Atlantic. In a brief, able, interesting speech, Mr. Gardner accepted the nomination. He was accorded a sincere ovation that lasted for nearly ten minutes.

The tariff has been revised in accordance with the Republican doctrine of protecting home industries and American labor. increases made were on luxuries and articles not of ordinary use. It was intended to afford and fifty cents will be charged. only adequate protection to the industries of the Nation, and to be fair alike to consumers, laborers and producers. No tariff bill was more unjustly assailed. It has justified the expectations of its friends by turning a National deficit into a surplus, while at the same time reducing the average rate of all duties. We believe that industrial accidents to workmen should be treated as inevitable incidents to industrial operations and the compensation thereof as part of the cost of productions.

We are persuaded that the experience of other countries demonstrates that this principle can be applied to our industrial condition without increasing the burdens of industry. The Republican party through Congress and

the President has shown its progressiveness in promoting navigable inland waterways, and in this connection we most earnestly commend the action of the Governor and the Legislature of New Jersey in supplementing these National waterways improvements with the great work which is being accomplished on the inland waterways of our State.

POST-OFFICE ROBBED THIEVES MAKE ESCAPE

LOOTED SAFE OF STAMPS AND CASH.

Robbery Perpetrated After Midnight In Bold Manner-Loss Reaches Nearly Two Thousand Dollars.

Thieves who left no trace of their identity broke into the post-office early yesterbooty amounting to \$1,802.83, after blowing open the safe with nitro-glycerine. Every feature of the robbery, say the authorities, gives evidence of experienced "main line" robbers. Postmaster L. W. Cramer discovered the robbery at half-past six o'clock yesterday morning and immediately notified the County on the trail of the robbers before noon. The noise of the explosions was heard by several persons, at about a quarter to two o'lock.

Gus Ritchie heard the explosions at the county power house and investigated, but could not detect where they came from. Like many another who heard them, he concluded it was someone shooting at cats or in sport, as shots are frequently fired late at night in this manner. Sylvester Roselle, who slept in his. barber shop all night, says he was awakened by the noise but was unharmed and feared to leave his shop for that reason. Michael Pantaelo, who has a store in the post-ffice building, says he did not hear the explosions, but his wife heard a noise and thought it was something


