PROSECUTOR MOORE CONSENTS TO INQUIRY INTO DETECTIVE BILLS

CONFERENCE WEDNESDAY WITH FREEHOLDERS ARRANGED

SOLONS WOULD REDUCE EXPENSE

Outcome May Be Amicable Understanding That Will End Disputes Over Payment For Special Investigations - Statute May Be Changed.

In pursuance to a resolution passed by the Board of Chosen Freeholders two months ago," naking the Prosecutor of the Pleas to hold s conference with a view to reducing the rathe large expenditures the Board has been asked to pay for special detective work, Solicitor E A. Higher of the Board has arranged for a conference of the Finance Committee with the Prosecutor Wednesday morning next, at 11 o'clock, at the office of the County Collector in

Atlantic City. Bills aggregating many thousands of dollars have already been paid by the Board, under protest, and two months ago others amountlug to nearly \$5,000 more were presented. These bills were approved by Prosecutor Charles S. Moore and County Judge C. C. Shinn and nocording to the present law, which it is hoped to have changed at the next session of the Legislature, the Freeholders will have to pay the claim. The latter believe, further, that the cost of special detective services could be reduced;

One of the strictest rules of the Board requires that all claims against the county be fully itemized and where expenses are incurred, that original bills be attached. These rules were not followed in making up the special detective bills, charges being made for so many days services together with expenses, without specifying where or how the service were performed or what the expenses were for. giving the Board no opportunity to inquire into the nature and correctness of the charges. Among the bills presented, one operator charges full days pay for services at two different places, with expenses, on the sum

Following the passage of the resolution calling for a conference, the bills were laid on the table. At the last meeting of the Board a communication was received from C. L. Cole, counsel for the detective agency, warning the Freeholders that he would apply for a writ of mandamus to force payment of the bills unless the Board paid them voluntarily. For the reason that Prosecutor Moore had been away and the Finance Committee had been unable to hold a conference with him, the bills were again laid over. Whether Mr. Cole will apply for a mandamus before the next meeting or no is not known, but it is thought he will await the outcome of the conference.

If these bills have to be puld on the order of the Prosecutor and the Court, which seems to be the law, many of the Freeholders believe they should be paid directly by the County Collector and not be presented to the Board for Mr. and Mrs. T. For the present, the Freeholders believe that the conflict can be largely overcome by bringing about a reduction of the expense. This will be the immediate object of Wednesday's conference, which will be held pursuant to the August resolution:

Whereas, on frequent occasions the tax payers of the county through the Board of Freeholders have been called upon to pay large sums of money for special detectives ordered by the Prosecutor of the Pleas.

"And whereas, while recognizing the anthority of said Prosecutor to order such services, we believe that much of this work could be done efficiently and economically by the regularly appointed county detectives and the police depriment of Atlantic City.

"Therefore, be it resolved, that the Finance Committee of this Board be and is hereby directed to invite the Prosecutor of the Pleas to a conference with the object of bringing about the conduct of investigations at less expense to the taxpayers of the county."

AUTO ACCIDENTS TAKE PLACE

Occupants Luckily Escape Serious Injury in Both Instances.

Regarded by autolsts as a dangerous point, the narrow concrete bridge above Lake Lenape on the Downstown Road, situated on a curve of the road, came near claiming several victims Tuesday morning last when a large touring car overturned trying to pass another, pinning the occupants, two men, a woman and four children, beneath. Fortunately the car, was going at a low rate of speed and no one was njured beyond minor cuts and bruises.

There is barely room between the concrete rulls of the bridge for two machines to pass. One machine had drawn up on the bridge for the purpose of getting water from the culvert when the second machine approached. The latter was almost by the bridge when the front wheels struck a sandy place, swerving the car into the bridge and down the embankment where it overturned.

Witnesses of the accident state that it was due entirely to the narrowness of the roadway on the bridge and the soft condition of the sides of the road. The resident freeholder has reported the matter to the road officials with a request that the bridge and turn be widened. ond accident took place sometime Tuesday evening or Wednesday morning at the Watering Place Bridge, on the road to Egg

Harbor City. This was apparently through sheer carelessness, as the road at this point is the first time. wide and solid. The machine first struck an iron standard on the bridge, denting it and knocking out a block of concrete, then reounded to the other side, ripping out twenty feet of fence and posts.

The first-mentioned machine was towed to local garage but the second was able to pro-ceed. Had the post on the bridge been s rooden one the machine would have landed in the creek.

The recognized losses due to these diseas have resulted in an increased demand on the part of the growers for seed which is more vigorous, free from disease, and true to name. The majority of our growers are dependen on the dealers at the point of origin and the point of destination of the seed. Many of these dealers visit Northern points and make pe sonal examinations of the seed, but these pre cautions do not necessarily result in vigorous healthy seed. This is due to the following facts: The persons making the examination frequently lack the necessary technical knowledge to recognize inconspicuous diseases which cause reductions in yield; the examination is frequently made late in the season or after digging, when it is impossible to recognize foliage diseases which reduce the yield; and many dealers and growers are more interested

In the price than in the quality of the seed The growing demand for better seed is being met in some Northern localities by many seed producers, who are growing seed subject to the supervision of state authorities, Inmeetions are made at blossoming time, as late as possible before ripening, and after digging plants, or a certain percentage of weak plants. or a certain percentage of variety mixtures will cause the field to be rejected for certification. Fields that meet the requirements are certified, and the seed sold in sealed bags, each carrying a copy of the certificate. This certificate should not be confused with the U.S. Department of Agriculture certificate, which applies to powdery scab only. The expense o

inspection is borne by the grower. Bome certified seed was used in New Jersey in 1915, and in most cases the resulting crop was better than the crop grown from ordinary seed. The future of certified seed will depend, in a large measure, upon the support which Northern growers receive from growers in New Jersey and other states. It is hoped that the New Jersey growers will use certified seed for at least a part of their crop in 1916. The New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station will be very glad to answer inquiries concern ing certified seed.

Permanent pusture on good land is gradually disappearing, only the rough fields being used for this purpose, and little if any attention being given to them. It is suggested that where stock is part of the farm equipment permanent pasture may be made a source o considerable revenue, the treatment being largely the same as that for meadows. A good mixture consists of timothy 8 lbs., red top 4 lbs., Kentucky blue grass 6 lbs., meadow fescue 2 lbs., red clover 4 lbs., alsike 2 lbs. The preparation of the land should include proper fertilization and lime at the rate of 40 hushels of burned lime or 8 tons of ground limestone for heavy soils, well worked in ten or twelve days previously to seeding, is recommended for heavy soils. If it is not convenient to use so large a quantity, top dressings of ground limestone should be made from time to time to sweeten the soil and encourage the growth the more valuable grasses and clovers. A mixture of 100 lbs, nitrate of sods, 150 lbs, acid phosphate and 50 lbs. muriate of potash, equivalent to a 6-8-8 formula, used at the rate of 300 the to the acre in early Spring is excellent for
