Voters who supported the Roosevelt ticket last Fall are not presented from voting in the Republican nominating convention unless they voted a year ago for "Majority" of the Progressive candidates. The election was plain enough on this score.

Some of them are already past all human aid and are in such a dangerous condition they should be removed.

The man who holds a public office must expect criticism. It is a necessary requirement of the office. He is a servant of the people, and unless the people express their desires, he has no other way of finding out what they want. The man who is afraid of criticism has no business in a public office, and the one who is never criticized is the one who never does anything. Even he is entitled to that for what he does not do. Pursuant to law notice is hereby given that the Board of Registry and Elections in and for

Absecon City,

County of Atlantic, State of New Jersey,

will meet on

Tuesday, September 9, 1913,

to make a house-to-house canvass,

and on

Tuesday, September 23, 1913,

and on

Tuesday, October 28, 1913.

At the hour of one o'clock in the afternoon of each session until nine (9) o'clock in the evening for the purpose of revising and correcting the registers and of making an accurate record of the right of suffrage in the respective election district at the next election who shall appear in person or by proxy of the majority of the board that they are entitled to vote in that election district at the next election. The names of the electors and the written affidavit of a voter residing in the same election district to be so entitled to vote, and the names of the names of any persons who are shown not to be entitled to vote therein by reason of non-residence or otherwise.

Election for all political parties will be held in each election district in the City on the 2d day of September, 1913, at the hour of seven (7) o'clock A. M. and nine (9) o'clock P. M. for the purpose of naming the candidates for the following offices:
