They will make a presentment of indictment found last week and this week at a sessio next Wednesday before Justice Samuel Kalish nd may hand in a special presentment. It is thought unlikely that the Jury wil extend their activities to the excise question But their jurisdiction in other cases besides those concerning election was made clear by Justice Kalisch recently when he remarked that "the jurisdiction of the grand jury could not legally be circumscribed." Justice Kalisch

Sixty-two indictments have been returned by the Jury in the election cases, exclusive of those found last week and this. The proceedngs were instituted the first of July and the tardiness of the Jury in completing its labors is said to have called for criticism from the Court. The date of trial of the first two cases to be heard, those of George Amole and Thomas McDevitt, is set for October 10, all the others for October 24. The date of Bheriff Johnson's trial on the technical indictment of removing registry books from the Clerk's Office has not been fixed.

Marstellar Loses Fight For Place By a Technicality. Holding that Howard T. Marsteller should have exhausted his remedies under the school law before applying to the courts, the Suprem ourt, in an opinion filed Monday has dismissed certiorari proceedings to have set aside his dismissal as supervising principal of th schools of Pleasantville, this County.

Marsteller was dismissed under a resolution adopted by the Pleasantville School Board May 4 last, which took effect May 11. He claimed the protection of the State Ter Tenure of Office Act, and applied to the Supreme Court for a writ of certionari on the ground that no charges had been preferred against him and that he had been discharged without a hearing.
