VOTERS BRAVE STORM TO NOMINATE TICKET

TAX RATE NOW LOWER

Fixed at \$1.91 for Hamilton Township This Year—A Drop From \$2.06—New Duplicates Ready For Collector.

The tax rate for the current year for Hamilton Township, as fixed by Assessor Harry Jenkins and approved by the County Board of Taxation, will be \$1.91, a drop from \$2.06, last year's rate.

Heavy increases in the valuation of Township property were first requested by the County Board, but Assessor Jenkins found from the first tax valuations as fixed in his duplicate and after several hearings the Board approved his duplicates and returned them.

Since the return of the duplicates on the 11th inst., the Assessor has been busy compiling his books, which are about ready for the Collector and statements will be issued by the latter official in the near future.
