Governor Woodry Wilson, who personally entered the primary campaign in Essex County, was severely rebuked by the defeat of all the candidates in whom he took an active interest. Following the sweeping defeat of the Wilson League, Jovernor Wilson expressed his acceptance of the voters verdict in fifteen words and then stopped talking. "I accept

have no further comment to make," He had entered the contest in Essex County as the principed advocate of the men running on the Wilson League ticket. Not only did he speak in their cause twice in Newark and once ln Oran but he attacked Assemblymen d Bracken, who were up for renoon the Regular Democratic ticket. It icant that both of these men ran abeac of their ticket. The phenomenal majority with which Assemblymen Bhalvoy and Bracken werd renominated is not the least striking in thorough sympathy with the policies repfor what is considered his unwarranted inter-

erence in strictly local political affairs. In Hudson the Governor was similarly repu diated. Five men seeking renomination be pictured as thoroughly reliable. It would be due obstruction in the laws to the free use of a disgrace to the county, the Governor said, if the ballot and therefor James J. McGrath, of Hoboken, should be renominated.
