FREE TRADE MENACES AMERICAN WORKMAN

DEMOCRACY'S REAL MOTIVE
UNMASKED.

Continued Good Times Depend On
Re-Election of Republican Presi-
dent and Congressmen and Pro-
tective Tariff.

Congressman John J. Gardner declares that the tariff is the paramount overshadowing issue in the campaign. So do President Taft and his leaders in the administration throughout the country. Captain Wilson delivers himself of a few moderate and unicolor remarks concerning the reduction of the cost of living through the reduction or abolition of the tariff and then makes the ingenious (or artful) change that the "Republicans are dodging the tariff question."

The protective tariff was created by the Republican party and since the time of its creation it has been the most popular nation on the face of the globe in all history. When the Democrats were last in power in the national government they monkeyed with the tariff and one of the most disastrous panics in the history of the country immediately resulted.

The Democratic party has been the party of Free Trade for many years. It has not attacked the tariff under the vague term of "tariff for revenue." But now that they are associated with the lotus dream that they are about to regain their hold on the national government they are dropping their hypocrisy to some extent and many of their leaders are coming out in favor of Free Trade.

Wilson, before he became a politician, was an out-and-out Free Trader. His writings last year in the *Atlantic City Journal* show that he is a doctrinaire Englishman at heart. He is the truest doctrinaire Englishman that is safely awaiting the leveling of the custom houses in this country. In that he can rush his cheap products into the United States and undersell the products of highly-paid American labor.

If Wilson and a Democratic Congress are placed in power the commercial dream of the British Empire will pass from the world. All that will remain is the protection of wages. It is the only way that the American producer could possibly meet the foreign producer on equal terms.

New Jersey is a manufacturing and farming State and Free Trade, or even the "revenue" reductions proposed by the Democrats, would bring it to the verge. If it did not rain, there are many men employed in the mills of this State who came from the country to escape the high cost of living. It will be up to the American workers to consult these importers and compare notes with them before they decide to vote against the system of protection that has made it possible for them to live a life of leisure, idle and reduce themselves and families to the condition of abject poverty that is the sad portion of the foreign workingmen.

The highest paid British workingman considers himself fortunate if he can have meat on the table once a week, and many of the unemployed there have to eat the taste of sand.

As far as farmers of New Jersey, Free Trade will bring them the same proportion as the laboring man; he would be brought into direct competition with the cheaply produced products of Canada, of Mexico and of South America. But, more serious than that, the prices of the products of the farm would naturally fall to the same level as those of Europe because the mass of consumers, the working classes, could not pay American prices on equal terms.

George H. Parker has stood for protection to American labor throughout his long career in Congress and he will continue to stand for it in the current campaign and on his return to the next Congress, and the voters of the Second District of New Jersey will do well to follow his arguments in the campaign progresses.

Discharged With Thanks By Court

REGRADE PRIMARY PUPILS. Better Distribution of Children Among Teachers As A Result.

The Board of Education desires to call the attention of the parents of the community to the changes in the manner of grading School No. 1, adopted by the Board following the recommendation of the Committee on Course of Study.

Some years ago the Primary department became so large that it was found necessary to divide it. Changes, however, have made conditions such that in the First Primary there are twenty-four children only and in the Second Primary but nineteen, while in the Fourth and Fifth Grades taught by Miss Collier, in order to realize the work as nearly as possible and to endeavor to increase the efficiency of the teaching corps, has combined the First and Second Primary, excepting the most advanced pupils, making a Primary or First Grade of thirty-four pupils to be taught by Miss Collier.
