# ADOPT STATE PLATFORM

Conservatively Progressive Policies Chosen By Republicans In Con-Taft Lauded By Delegates.

conservatively progressive platform was adopted Tuesday last by the State Republican Convention held in Trenton. This was the first time that a State Convention was held under the new Geran act, which limits delegates holdover Benators, Benatorial and Assembly oundidates.
