The agronomist of the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station advises that as soon as the ears are removed from the huaks they should be placed in a room where they can be quickly dried. For small quantities this can be done under the kitchen stove or in a room above a hot air radiator. After the ears are thoroughly dried they should be placed in a well ventilated room on racks or corn trees, where they are protected from mice, rais and insects. Corn carefully selected, well matured and properly dried and stored will possess strong vitality. Such seed should give a vigorous stand next year.

Leaf spot attacks the foliage of the cherry and plum, causing peculiar brown spots. When severe, the leaves turn yellow and full. In very severe cases the trees may be defoliated. This trouble is the cause of very heavy losses in both nursery and orchard. The department of plant pathology at the New Jersey Experiment Station in a recent bulletin states that this trouble may be controlled by spraying with self-boiled lime-sulfur after gathering the fruit,

ANYTHING OVER YEAR OLD CANDIDATE FOR BUCKSHOT

GUNNERS SHOULD USE CAUTION

Witnesses To Legal Shooting - Recommended To Avoid Strange Feature of New Law-Wardens. On Alert - Hunting In Dark Prohibited—Hounds Still Under Ban—Game Plentiful.

Deer hunters throughout the State are oiling heir guns and looking over their ammunition n anticipation of the first day of the season, Wednesday next. Instead of having five days n succession, they will be allowed to kill des this year on the last three Wednesdays in October and the first Wednesday in November. In addition to the regular County game wardens, special wardens will patrol the deer woods to enforce the game laws, which are

very strict Since the accidental shooting of several gunners during the past seasons most hunters have adoted the safeguard of wearing red cap and this, sportsmen are trusting, will be the rule this sesson, for with so many gunners in the woods, many of them pervous at the sign of anything moving in the brush, greatest one must be observed to prevent accidents. Novices are cautioned to keep their fingers away from the triggers of their guns untit they are sure what they are siming at is a deer and not another hunter.

The difficulty of distinguishing does from bucks is done away with this sesson, for the revised law permits the killing of any deer, doe or fawn more than one year old. It is illegal to use any rifle, or firearm of any kind of a calibre smaller than twelve guage, or to use missie larger than a buckshot, to hunt at night, or to hant with dogs. Only one deer a year may be taken by any one gunner,

Possession of a deer on any day except the days on which killing is permitted, is acco ing to the strict letter of the law, illegal and inishable by a fine of one hundred dollars.
