GRAND JURY URGES EARLY PROVISION FOR TUBERCULOSIS VICTIMS

SPECIAL PRESENTMENT IS
MADE TO ENCOURAGE
FREEDOMERS

FORTY INDICTMENTS IMPOUNDED

PLEAS WILL BE TAKEN TUESDAY
NEXT—BETTER REGULATIONS ARE

SPECIAL PRESENTMENTS, one urging the Board of Chosen Freeholders to early action in the care of a tuberculosis hospital and the other, concerning better highway traffic regulations, were handed in Thursday by the May Grand Jury, together with a batch of forty indictments, which were impounded, and the whole adjourned with the thanks of the court.

NEW QUARTERS NEEDED FOR GRAND JURY WORK

SECOND STORY WILL LIKELY BE ADDED TO
REAR COURT ROOM.

Following a recommendation by the Grand Jury, the Building Committee of the Board of Freeholders will ask the Board Wednesday next for permission to advertise for bids for a new story addition to the new wing of the Court House for the purpose of providing a new grand jury room, which is badly needed.

The present grand jury room is far too small for the large amount of work transacted by the jury. Twenty to thirty men are confined in a small room, with poor light and ventilation, for hours at a time. From session to session, jurors have complained of the quarters but no action has been taken heretofore.

Judge Charles Black, appointed by Governor James Fielder to succeed Justice Samuel Kalisch, will hold his first session here Tuesday, when he will open the October Term of County Courts and set dates for three homicide trials pending for the term.

Judge Howard Carroll will be present to open Circuit Court and Judge Clinton Shinn will hold a session of the Orphans' and Criminal Courts.

Criminal business for the term promises to be heavy and there are a large number of civil cases listed.
