MURDERER AT LARGE

Italian Wanted For Murder of Northfield Boy Eludes Pursuers And Is Thought to Be Hiding In County Woods.

No crime committed in Atlantic County in recent years has caused more excitement than be shooting of Marino Italiano, a 17-year-old Italian boy, at Northfield last Wednesday evening by an Italian called "Tony" who escaped and has been blding in the woods since, though hundreds of people have been on the hunt with County Detective William II. Battzell and other detectives to capture the man. Marino dled in the Atlantic City Hospital as a result of the shooting and his assailant is wanted on the charge of murder, The mother of the lad was wounded while at-

According to the most authentic reports of the affair, "Tony" was a border at the Italion to strangers who pass through in autos or land home and a few days ago massed some money. He is said to have accused Marino of taking it and left the house after a quarrel, returning with a constable. That was not sufficient satisfaction it seems for he went back to the house while the Italianos were cating supper and without a word fired three shots into the lad's body, inflicting a serious wound on the mother and sending a build through the dress of a sister.

The description given to the police departaent of the man is rather vague, but it is said-he-is-about 140 pounds in weight, dark complexioned, with a moustache, wearing light corduroy trousers, a shirt without a collar, a dark cont and a derby hat.
