QUICK JERSEY JUSTICE

Italian Indicted, Arraigned and Sentenced to Thirty Years Imman-Now In State Prison.



OPENING OF THE GREAT PENN-SYLVANIA STATION IN NEW YORK.

On Sunday, November 27, full train service will be inaugurated by the Pennsylvania Railroad to and from its new station at Seventh Avenue at Thirty-second Street, New York City.
