

# CARBOW OPENS COURT

## NEW GRAND JURY. BRIEFLY

Lawyers Warned To Have Case

In the absence of Justice Manuel Kellach, the Supreme Court, the October Term of the County Courts was opened Tuesday morning last by Judge Howard Carrow, of the Circuit Court, assisted by Judge Clarence L. Cole, of the Common Pleas Court. Judge Cole briefly changed the Grand Jury after selecting George T. Lippincott as foreman, touching only on the cases on the list, and then adjourned to the Circuit Court and Judge Cole retired to the Criminal Court room where he opened the Court of Common Pleas.

Judge Carrow went over the list of Civil causes and remarked: "There are nearly a hundred cases on the list and these should be speedily tried. I intend to be here the best part of four weeks and will open court every morning at 10.30 in order to dispose of these cases." He then adjourned. He said: "I had an aim willingly hold court on Saturdays either here or in a Justice Court to expedite matters. I ask the members of the bar that they have their cases

ready when they are called so that there will be no delay. It costs over a hundred dollars a day to hold the train here, and the cars are

The only case to come up Tuesday was that of Charles K. Meyers, of the Hotel Rodolf, lantie City, against Mildred J. Brown to collect \$15,000 and interest on a note given by the latter on July 2, 1912. There was no defense and Judge Carroll directed the jury to bring a verdict of \$15,167.50 for the plaintiff.
