Carrots intended for Winter use should be havested at once. If allowed to remain in the ground the top part of the carrots will be frozen during the cold nights. The thawing which follows causes the skin to slip; also small cracks are left throughout the frozen

portions. The method commonly practiced in gathering the crop is first to loosen the carrots with a potito fork and then to lift them out by their tops and lay them parallel in windrows. By placing all the carrots with their tops turned to the right, a person can cut off the tops with a knife in his right hand as fast as he can pick up the carrots with his left hand and throw them into buskets.

The way in which carrots should be stored depends upon the following factors: the mount to be stored, the storage space within doors, the purpose for which they are kept, whether for stock feed or for table use, and the time at which they are to be used. 
New Building Not Accepted.
