Representatives will be elected in Atlantic County next Tuesday, election day, and every Republican candidate on the county ticket, together with the great majority of local candidates in the various districts, are sure of election and the voters will give their backing to Governor Walter E. 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NEW BRAVEL HIGHWAYS SERIOUS UNDERTAKING

Engineer Nelson Points Out Necessity Of Future Maintenance.
In the last issue of "The American City," County Engineer A. B. Nelson contributes a highly interesting article on "The Construction of Gravel Roads in Atlantic County," from which the following excerpts are taken:

A few years ago New Jersey's roads held the reputation of being among the finest in the land, but we were building with regard to the future's demands. The bulk of the money for gravel road construction was long ago expended on our main thoroughfares; then came experimentation, and the end is not yet all of which applies to local communities.

The first regularly constituted highway improvement in Atlantic County was undertaken in 1895, when work on the White Horse Pike—the direct route to Philadelphia—was commenced and about 5 miles of it were graded and gravelled. In 1902 the first gravel road in New York was begun, and about 21 miles were graded and gravelled.

It is fully recognized that a gravel road surface cannot be a permanent improvement, and we appreciate that, in building such, we are increasing our work for the future; having once had a "good road," the community and the general public will naturally desire to have a permanent improvement.
