

REPUDIATION OF WILSON AND DEMOCRATIC REGIME

B. O. P. CONTROLS LEGISLATURE

Eyes Of Nation On This State's Verdict — Republicans Firmly Entrenched In Senate And Assembly With Big Majority On Joint Ballot.

Repudiation of the present State and Ne tional administrations and the strengthenin of the Republican majority in the Laginiature vore the outstanding features of last Toseday's ection in New Jersey. The election in this State was watched throughout the nation, e Jersey is considered "Wilson's State" and the result is significant of the waning strength of the administration,

New Jersey's next Legislature will be made up at follows; Senate, thirteen Republicans and eight Democrats; Assembly, forty-one Republicans and nineteen Democrats. This will give the Republicans a majority, on joint ballot, of twenty-seven. Last year's majority was seventeen. In more local aspects of the election, Republicans captured offices held by poorate for many years. Throughout almost the entire State Republi-

can gains were in evidence and in some ections they were so marked as to be at first almost unbelieveable. The Progressive party, which had nominated Assembly candidates in only six counties, cut a negligible figure.

Except in Burlington and Passaic Counties where the Republican candidates made a runaway, the contests for Benators were unusually close. Thus in Cape May. Lewis T. Stevens. , had a plurality of 90, while on the Democratic side, Prosecutor W. Edwin Florance was elected in Middlesex by a plurality of 239. and Senator Samuel T. Munson was resleeted in Sussex by a plurality of 179. Even in Hunterdon the Democratic plurality, which ranges generally from 1,900 to 2,000, was out down to 810, the figure by which Benstor George F. Martens, Jr., was re-elected.

On the Republican side ex-Speaker Thomas F. McCran was elected Senator from Passalo by a plurality of 8,043, and Harold B. Wells, o Burlington, by a piprality now placed at more than 8,000. Besides gaining two Senators the Republicans, therefore, gave their adversaries the closest kind of a battle in both Middleses and Bussex.






