SWEEPING VICTORY IN
CITY AND COUNTYCONFIDENCE REAFFIRMED
IN GRAND OLD PARTY.Ingersoll, Godfrey and Richards
Strongly Supported—Bacharach
and Keffler Victors By Big Margin—Election Most Orderly.

Residents of Atlantic City and County reaffirmed their faith and allegiance to the Grand Old Party Tuesday last by electing every Republican candidate on the City and County Tickets, with the exception of one Councilman, by big majorities, the result of the people and repudiating the slanderous efforts of their political opponents, whose campaign was based on threats against everything Republican and the avowed purpose to elect Woodrow Wilson.

In Atlantic City Harry Bacharach was elected Mayor by a majority of nearly 1,000. Recorder Martin E. Keffler was re-elected with a similar majority.

In Hamilton Township the Republican Party won a decisive victory, both for Township and County Tickets. John E. Izard, Republican candidate for Township Committee, man over Charles C. Mearns, Democratic candidate for re-election, by a majority of 84. The closest contest was between Joseph Leach, Republican candidate for Constable, and Emanuel Taylor, Democratic candidate, Leach winning out by the narrow margin of four votes. All the other Republican candidates were elected, their majorities appearing in another column.

It was one of the most orderly elections ever held here, but a large number of voters did not turn out, only 880 out of a total registration of 544 casting their ball. Many did not vote because of the new form of ballot, and a large number of persons required assistance. The sentiment is decidedly against the ballot in the present form. Many mistakes in the ballots were apparent, caused by misunderstanding regarding the way to mark for the candidates.

COUNTY SOLONS MET HERE

Start War On Telephone Company
—Bourgeois Lumber Bill Paid—
Inspect New County Buildings—
Dine As Solicitor's Guests.

War on the Bell Telephone Company was begun Wednesday by the Board of Chosen Freeholders, which held its meeting at the County House for the purpose of inspecting the completed Sheriff's residence and office and the improvements to the Clerk's Office. On motion of Freeholder Frank Enderlin, it was ordered that the Bell Telephone Co. be notified to remove every pole and wire on County property. This action was precipitated by the refusal of the company to provide telephone facilities at the Chestnut Neck bridge, where a telephone is frequently needed in case of accident. Similar action was taken by the County Freeholders of Camden County a few months ago.

After months of contention and litigation over a bill for lumber furnished for bridge work in Weymouth Township by order of Freeholder Bourgeois, the Board voted payment of the claim at the rate of \$42.50 per thousand feet for the lumber.

Freeholders Samuel Winterbottom, William Robinson and Fred Willets were appointed a committee to draft resolutions on the death of the late Freeholder John H. Halsey, of Hamilton Township, to report at the next meeting of the Board.

Chairman Robinson, of the Road Committee, urged that the contractors who are building the Shore Road be notified that the work is not progressing as rapidly as expected, and action was taken to hurry the work.

County Engineer F. D. Rightmire presented plans and specifications for retaining walls for the Chestnut Neck bridge, which were accepted, and bids will be advertised for, to be opened at the next meeting. Similar action was taken on the plans and specifications for new approaches at the Green Bank bridge, with other repairs, to place it in first-class condition for travel. Plans were ordered drawn for the construction of a concrete deck and concrete wing walls for the English Creek bridge.

The Board adjourned at noon to make an inspection of the new Sheriff's residence, which is one of the finest buildings ever erected in this County, and also to inspect the new addition of a second story to the County Clerk's Office. After work, consisting of payment of current bills, was completed before final adjournment, after which the Freeholders dined at the American Hotel, as the guests of the Hon. F. A. Higbee, Solicitor of the Board.
