STRONG SEEKS NEW TRIAL

Supreme Court Hears Argument that Medium's Testimony was Worthless

Before the Justices of the Supreme Court, itting Monday lest in Trenton, former Judge John W. Westcott, of Camden, made an appeal for re-trial of William H. Strong, the aged Nesco farmer, now serving a thirty year term for the murder of his wife a year ago last Octo ber on their lonely farm near Elwood. Will Follow Policy and Offenders viction was largely based, was incompetent evidence. The exhibition of the murdered woman's throat in Court and numerous tech nical rulings of the Court were further urged as reasons why the accused man should have a new trial.

Jodge Westcott's arguments against the egality of Madam Gerard's testimony, were chsational, alleging that she had entered into conspiracy with detectives to force a "con fession" from Strong's lips and that the old farmer, credulous and readily influenced by heavy publishment for those who resort to her hypnotle powers, was either forced to say things absolutely untrue or that the woman sobbling man so the detectives, who were hiding behind a screen, could get the confession.

Strong on the sland denied that he eve made such statements to the medium as were attributed to him and pleaded that if he did, he was not in his right mind at the time and tid not know what was going on about him, He said that he became violently ill at the time owing to the medium's influence over him or some drug she had administered. The Justices took the appeal under consideration and will announce decision later.

Supreme Court Hears Motion To Quash Bill Found By Special Grand Jury Against Sheriff City. Johnson-Decision Reserved.

Former Judge Oilbert Collins made a motion Monday last before the Supreme Court to augh the indictment found against Sheriff Enoch L. Johnson by the special elisor-drawn grand jury charging him with removing registry books from the Clerk's Office. The indletment was removed to the Supreme Cour recently on a writ of certiorari granted by Justice Kalisch. Decision was reserved.

Counsel for Sheriff Johnson argued that the offense alleged against him is statutory and not indictable. It was urged that there is only one statute which makes it indictable for the Sheriff to take away any record from a public office and this section applies only to books or records of any of the courts or of the office of

It was argued that the registry books were not books of any court or of any clerks of any court. They were not books referring to any verdiet, judgment, sentence or other record uch as referred in the Crimes Act.

It was further claimed that the sheriff had a right to remove those books for the purpose o selecting names for juries and that the indict ment did not allege that the books were emoved against the will of the county clerk In all these points it was contended that the idictment does not charge any crime under the statutes or at common law. Connect also argued that the special grand Jury which found the indictment was not legally drawn and that there was no law for disqualifying the sheriff and naming clisors as was done in this case.
