PENITENTIARY TERMS METED OUT BY COURT

FOUR TAKEN TO TRENTON BY SHERIFF

Getz and Hipson Sentenced To Sixty Days In County Jail—Three Indictments Nolle Prossed—May Clear Calendar Coming Week.

Two State Prison term were imposed by Judge C. J. Cole this week, which, with Samuel Smith, colored, convicted last week of manslaughter, and George Williams, apprehended for beating his wife after having been left out on parole, gave Deputy Sheriff Joseph R. Bartlett four prisoners to convey to the penitentiary Thursday morning last.

Harry Getz, convicted by a Jury in the Court of Quarter Sessions last week of stealing a poll and registry book during the election of 1910, was sentenced Monday by Judge Cole to serve term of sixty days in the County jail.

Alexander Hipson, saloonkeeper of 1817 Avenue, who pleaded guilty to selling on Sunday, was sentenced to serve a term of sixty days in the County jail by Judge Cole.

Joseph Hoffman was convicted of an assault and battery on Frank Schenck, of Absecon, and sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 in weekly installments of \$1. Hoffman attacked Schenck with a rake and inflicted several wounds on the latter's wrist.

Benjamin Holmes, of Pleasantville, was found not guilty of committing an assault and battery on Louis Selby.

Bertie Descheldecker was acquitted when placed on trial charged with an atrocious assault and battery on Joseph Collins. It was alleged that she had attacked the man with a razor.

Henry Wright pleaded guilty to a charge of assault and battery. Sentence was suspended. Fred Gooding, charged with the bairony of jewelry, retracted his plea of not guilty to guilty. He was fined \$100.

Belle Miller, charged with assault and battery, pleaded guilty and was released under a suspended sentence.

Bruce Johnson was acquitted on a charge of assault and battery.

Constable James Hamilton, of Absecon, was acquitted of a charge of assault and battery.

Rose Swain, colored, was sentenced to serve a term of not less than one and not more than three years in the state Prison when convicted on an indictment charging her with larceny.

The woman pleaded not guilty to the charge, but the State produced testimony to show that she had stolen \$17 from the person of Charles Bumbers, a white man, when the two were drinking together. The woman, who is a notorious character and has often appeared as the defendant in the police court, vigorously denied the charge, but the evidence against her was overwhelming.

A sentence amounting to from three to fourteen years in State Prison was imposed upon William Carter, colored, who pleaded guilty to breaking and entering several stores. Two other charges for the same offense were not pressed by the State. The Court sentenced Carter to serve a term of not less than one and a half and not more than seven years in the State Prison for burglarizing the store of Harry Bendelman. A like sentence was passed upon him for breaking in and entering the store of Charles Bumbers. The Court ordered that the sentence be served consecutive.

On motion of Assistant Prosecutor Elmer Brown, Judge Cole ordered that the following indictments be nolle prossed: Charles Del Dosa, the Justice of the Peace of Minotola, indicted for extortion; William Way, false pretenses and J. H. Reed, assault and battery.

George Holder was acquitted of the charge of assaulting Henry Cost.

Mary Ash, colored, entered a plea of guilty to an indictment charging her with the larceny of a diamond stick pin and \$70 in money from Mrs. Bernard Durkin at Atlantic City. Sentence was deferred until the Court can make an investigation.

An effort will be made, by Prosecutor Moore next week to clear the docket of all cases which as yet have not been tried and he and Assistant Prosecutor Brown have been spending the last few days rounding these into shape. It is thought that a session of the Court will be held Tuesday, Wednesday and possibly Friday of next week and probably all of the week following. There are several big cases awaiting trial and the Prosecutor's office labors to enter the new year with a clean slate.
