A.L.a. menting of the Advisory Board of the Department of Farm Demonstration, field Wednesday afternoon last at the Court House, great satisfaction was expressed by the mem-bers from several farming sections with the s of the demonstration work during its first year in Atlantic County and plans were ed for making the department still more useful to the farmers during the coming year. In addition to demonstrations of various kinds made during the past year, 871 visits were made to various farms throughout the county and the Demonstrator received \$18 visits at his office. Among the new projects to be taken up during the coming year will be Orehard Management, Value and Use of Leguminous Crops and Poultry Raising.

The members of the Board were enthusiastic in their praise of the good work done in this manner. Mr. Huenke said he could not state the value of it too emphatically. Many farmers who did not notify the Demonstrator of the cholers among their hogs lost every snims! and in the midst of the infected district those who had their animals treated suffered only a light loss or none at all. As the result of so many neglecting to report this infectious disome, the Board recommended legislation obliging every farmer to report cases of cholers ng his swine. \

Mr. Huenke was also outspoken in his praise of the efficient manner in which the Demon strator had overcome the strawberry weevil. which for many years has caused heavy losses to county farmers. On Mr. Huenke's farm. treatment for the trouble resulted in practically complete control of the weevil. A bulletin will be issued as a result of the experiment for the instruction of farmers generally.

several said they had so naily good results, and sometimes better, on their farms without notash. Prof. Ages sperfisted, however, that much of the potash used in preceding years remained in the soil. All agreed, however that the lack of this ingredient of fertilizen will not cause any serious embarassment to county farmers, for a time at least, "I am but not so much as we used to think."

Experiments with Soudan grass have reanited anccessfully on several county farms the grass in some instances reaching a height of seven feet. It was declared a good drouth resistant, a sorghum and a fair fodder, especi ally when mixed with other crops.

In order to hold frequent conferences and get together quickly in case of emergency, the Board was divided into four groups representing different sections, who can be called to ther by the Demonstrator on short notice. The Board adjourned to meet again in March
