Orchards Improved, Alfalfa Growing Encouraged, Soil Inoculation Taught, Strawberry Weevil Controlled, Hog Cholera Checked and Many Other Good Results Accomplished By Demonstrator.

A.A. member of the Advisory Board of the Department of Farm Demonstration, Edith Wednesday afternoon last at the Court House, great satisfaction was expressed by the members from several farming sections with the success of the demonstration work during the first year in Atlantic County and plans were discussed for making the department still more useful to the farmers during the coming year.

One of the most beneficial results of the demonstration work during the past year was the inoculation of more than 500 hogs in sections where cholera was prevalent, resulting in saving many farms from the ravages of the disease.

Mr. Hoeneke was also outspoken in his praise of the efficient manner in which the Demonstrator had overcome the strawberry weevil, which for many years has caused heavy losses to county farmers.

The matter of home-made fertilizer, that had on the field as a much lower cost gave fully as good results as the factory-made.
