NEW COUNTY ASYLUM ACCEPTED BY BOARD SPLENDID INSTITUTION

COST OF BUILDING NEAR

FAVOR LOWER ROAD ROUTE

Freeholders Believe Northern Way
Would Be Impractical For Absecon - Atlantic City Boulevard—
Members and Officials Dined By
Supt. Tobias J. McConnell
After Session.

The new addition to the County Asylum at May's Landing, built by Capt. John W. Emory, was inspected by the Board of Chosen Freeholders Wednesday last at an adjourned meeting held for that purpose and finally, after two months of negotiations, the contractor agreed not to impose the fine of \$25 a day for the extra time the contractor needed over the time set in the contract to complete the work.

With this addition the Atlantic County Asylum is one of the finest in the State and capable of taking care of a large number of inmates. Large comfortable dormitories, well lighted, heated and ventilated and provided, the entire building is fireproof and gratings provided over all openings to prevent the escape of inmates.

A communication from Mr. A. T. Bell requesting the Board to survey a proposed new route for the Absecon-Atlantic City boulevard North of the one already surveyed was read and laid on the table, the concurrence of opinion among the members seeming to be in favor of the Northern route, which it is said can be built at a lower cost and is superior in several respects to the Northern route.

STAMP TAXES EFFECTIVE

More "War Assessments" In Time Of Peace—Pay Up!

Beginning with December 1 all taxes, renewals of notes, legal documents etc., will require a special war tax stamp, in accordance with the law enacted by the last session of Congress.

Every note, or renewal of note, no matter how small will require a special 2 cent war tax stamp up to the amount of \$100, and an additional stamp for every additional \$100 or fraction thereof will be required.

A note therefore of \$100 will require 20 cents in stamp. Every check or note which goes to protest will be subject to a stamp of 25 cents in addition to the regular protest fee. Many bank depositors have been misinformed and are of the opinion that every check must have a 2 cent war stamp upon it. This is not the case and the officials of the local bank wish us to inform depositors that no war stamp is required upon checks other than above stated. Legal documents such as wills, mortgages, etc. also require a war tax stamp upon them.

"WAR TAX" NOW PAYABLE DELAY WILL CAUSE FINE

Cigar Dealers, Pool Rooms, etc. Have
Only Two Days More To Pay Up.

Collector J. Moffett, of the First Internal Revenue District of the State of New Jersey, hereby通知ed parties interested that under the Emergency Act of October 22, 1914, there are special taxes according against the following classes of bankers, brokers, dealers, and manufacturers. These special taxes are effective November 1, 1914, and applications must be filed within the month of November 1914, and the taxes paid within that period, and apply to bankers; brokers; pawnbrokers; commercial brokers; custom houses; brokers; and commission merchants; proprietors of theatres, museums, concert halls, and moving picture shows; proprietors of circuses, proprietors of agents of other exhibitions or shows for money; and proprietors of bowling alleys, pool and billiard rooms; dealers in lead tobacco; dealers in tobacco, cigars, snuff and cigarettes, whose annual receipts are \$200, or more, manufacturers of tobacco; manufacturers of cigars, and manufacturers of cigarettes.

It is imperative that all the above named classes of dealers and manufacturers should give this notice their prompt attention, as unless the applications are filed for the special tax stamp and the taxes paid within the present month of November, there will accrue a fine.
