The Board of Canvassem, named by Governor Taylor to canyons the result of the recent election, met in the Executive Office Tuesday and found that the total vote east in New Jer sey Tuesday, November 4, was 491,867. The total registration was 403,880.

Of the total, Fleider received 173,148 as against 40,208 for former Governor Stokes, the Republican candidate. Fleider's pluralty over Blokes was \$2,850. The total vote received by former Senator Everett Colby, the Progressive candi date, was 41,132.

Aside from Governor Fielder, former Governor Stokes and former Penator Colby, the candidates of the other parties received the follow ing vote: Butterworth, Socialist-Labor, 2460; Dwyer, Independent, 875; Mason, National Prohibition, 3,427; Rellly, Socialist, 13,977.
