Standards had been removed on the lower floor to make more room and weakened the support of the second floor and the heavy crowd overhead caused the latter to give way. The standards which had been removed were recured at once and replaced, the floor being raised to its normal position. But though apparently the building was again in a much more rafe condition, it was decided to discontime the Fair therein and the ladies of the church, assisted by a score of volunteers, at once began the removal of the booths and

The hall was beautifully decorated and a large number of articles had been sold when the accident occurred. 
