JOINT TRIAL FOR NINE SHORE COUNCILMEN

COURT REFUSES MOTION FOR SEVERANCE.

Gillison Disfranchised for Five Years - Magill Fined \$500and Confesses To Charge.

At a session of the Court of, Over and Terminer held Tuesday last before Supreme Court Justice Bamuel Kallsch, former building inspector Alfred Gillison, of Atlantic City, was disfranchised for a period of five years by Justice Kalisch, who held with Attorney General Wilson that the attempt was a crime under the statutes.

Span To Connect Somers Point and Ocean City Will Link Two Counties.

Plans for the Ocean City - Somers Point auto bridge have been approved by the War Department. As this can be done with but a slight alteration in the lines, the recommendation will be accepted by the bridge company. 
