

PAVE OCEAN BOULEVARD  
VENTNOR TO LONGPORTBUT NO ACTION ON ROAD  
TO TUCKAHOE.Sheriff Will Be Provided With At-  
lantic City Office—Contracts For  
Bridge Work Awarded—New  
Freeholder Seated.

Resolutions providing for paving the ocean boulevard from Ventnor to Longport, which will complete a paved road from Absecon Inlet to the Great Egg Harbor Inlet, were adopted Wednesday last by the Board of County Freeholders at their regular monthly meeting held in Memorial Hall, Atlantic City. The resolutions were introduced by E. A. Stephens, Road Commissioner, County E. D. Rightmire, and were adopted by a vote of 10 to 1.

Appointment of a County Superintendent of Weights and Measures was defeated by an adverse vote, motion being made for nomination at the suggestion of William L. Waldron, State Supt. of Weights and Measures.

Sheriff Robert H. Ingersoll informed the board in regard to a branch office in Atlantic City, arguing that attorneys and lawyers would be greatly aided by this innovation. City Solicitor Harry Woolton also spoke on behalf of the County Bar Association, and a resolution providing for the office was offered and carried.

A letter received from Colonel Stevens on the May's Landing-Tuckahee County road was recommended. Freeholder Bourgeois, through whose land the proposed highway will run, asked that the County Engineer report on his work in connection with the road. It developed that an amicable agreement cannot be reached on the rebuilding of the substructure of the dam over the Estevale Pond. Freeholder Bourgeois contends that the County should pay for the rebuilding of the substructure, while on the other hand the State Road Commissioner and County Solicitor Hodge are inclined to believe that the County should not be bound by the opinion of the matter have been asked from the Attorney-General, in whose hands the matter has been placed.

Freeholder Charles D. MacKee, appointed from Hamilton Township to fill the unexpired term of the late John S. Risley, took his seat at the meeting Wednesday. Resolutions on the death of the late Freeholder Risley were adopted and a copy ordered sent to the family.

Bids for the building of the Paterson Creek bridge were received by the board. The contract was awarded to the Nelson-Meredyth Company, of this city, for \$38,170. The other bidders were Edward L. Bader, whose price was \$39,500, and the Atlantic Construction and Supply Company, whose bid was \$39,700.

The contract for building the retaining wall for the Chestnut Neck bridge was awarded to George P. Hamilton, of Camden, for \$4,980. Other bids were: Edward L. Bader, \$7,490; Atlantic Construction and Supply Company, \$7,490. Hamilton was also awarded the contract for building the bulkhead of the Green Bank bridge, for \$2,280. Other bids were: Edward L. Bader, \$1,685; Atlantic Construction and Supply Company, \$1,630.

## PASSENGER ASKS DAMAGES.

Sues Trolley Company Alleging Con-  
ductor Started Car Too Soon.

Suit for damages sustained in October, 1906, alleging from an Atlantic Avenue trolley that started before the green light had turned, causing injury to the plaintiff, was instituted yesterday by Miss Katherine Cunningham before Judge C. L. Cole in Circuit Court and will be completed this morning. The company, which opened its defense yesterday afternoon, is endeavoring to prove negligence on the part of the complainant.

Miss Cunningham was a waitress in the Marlborough-Blenheim at the time the accident occurred and has since been unable to work. In her story on the stand, she said another woman had just alighted and she was about to step off the car when the conductor gave the signal to go ahead. She was thrown against the side of the car, her shoulder dislocated, knee-cap broken and spine injured. She has since been unable to walk and appeared in court in a rolling chair.

Elmer H. Chandler is representing the plaintiff, the company being defended by George A. Bourgeois. Following the completion of the evidence for the defense this morning the lawyers will sum up and the case will go to the jury. The amount of damages asked has not been announced by the complainant.
