New Jersey Spends \$28.38 Annually For Each of Four Hundred Thousand Pupils Enrolled In Schools -- Interesting Figures In Report.

It costs the State of New Jersey the sum o \$28.38 to educate each of the 442,958 pupils enrolled in the public schools, according to an nteresting report submitted Saturday last by Commissioner Calvin N. Kendall to the State Board of Education. The report was for the year ending June 30 last, so that it covers the year preceding Commissioner Kendall's appointment as executive head of the State schools.

The report shows receipts amounting t \$31,100,979, or an increase of \$8,057,565 over the tenchers' salaries was \$9,206,169, an increase of \$618,395 over the preceding year. For fuel and junitors' services there was expended \$1,178,100; for text books, apparatus and supplies, \$700,543; for other school purposes, \$1,89,155; for transportation of pupils, \$185,000; and for tuiton of
