Origin of Life.

The many speculations that have been published concerning the origin of life on the earth and on any other odles in the universe where it may possibly exist usually assume that, in some way or other, "life germs" are transported across the gulfs of space from one planet to another. Thus it has been suggested that life may have been brought to the earth in meteors One of the most recent suggestions is that minute "life germs" may escape from the atmosphere of a planet in which life exists, just na molecules of the atmospheric gases are believed to escape from our terrestrial atmosphere, and may be driven by light pressure to some world where physical conditions have become suitable to support life. While there is nothing essentially absurd in these hypotheses, it is not clear why their authors should take it for granted that life cannot originate de novo on a cooling planet.-Scientific American.

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

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
