

COSSACKS OF THE CZAR.



News dispatches from various parts of Russie report how the Cossacks have made brutal use of their sabers and whips against the excited people. The Cossach's whip is an instrument of torture, and it is used by these semibarbarian followers of the Osar with wonderful experimens, Generally the whip has but one thong or lash; occasionally it has two or three. The end of each thong is loaded with a bit of from or lead to render the pain and wound inflicted, more intense. A Cossack has been known to pick in eve from a man's face with a blow of his miniature knout. He can split an apple on man's head with a cut of the lash, and be tan snip off the burning end of a match held in a comrade's fingers. But no thoughts as to accuracy of stroke govern him when confronted with a vengeful, howling mob. Then he simply lays about him with the full strength of his justy arm, and the reciptent of the blows will remember for a lifetime that he has had an encounter with these deraded hirelings of absolutism.

The Cossacks are said to be of Tartar origin. They generally inhabit the steppes of Russia about the lower Don and Dnleper, but are found in lesser number in eastern Russia, Omcasia and Siberia. The Horriculturists claim that the railroada in keeping the troiley freight handling pro hibition law on the statue books, were injur ing their business by compelling them to payprohibitive freight rates They passed strong resolution asking the Legislature

repeal the anti-freight trolley carrying law This matter was brought up in the addre f President W. H. Skiliman, of Belle Mead and it was referred for action to the Commi tee on Legislation, composed of E. P. Beeb of Elisabeth; C. C. Hulsert and Horac Roberts, of Burlington, after the resolution embodied in the President's report, had been
