THE CZAR CZARINA AND TREIR CHILDREN. Though pessessed of the most autografic power Czar Nicholas IL of Russia is very democratic. Though having at his command the greatest military engine of the world, at least in potentiality, he yet is foremost among the great rulers in his advocacy of peace. Though in a position that demands display and even estentation of a certain kind, he is retiring to the point of timidity and very domestic and home loving. These contradictions between his situation and his character mark him as peculiar not only among the czara but among royalties generally. While not particularly forceful or marked by great intellectual powers, he is singularly humane and simple, and it is these qualities perhaps that Russia most needs in the present state of her development

It is these characteristics which are also found in the Czarins. In her early training and her inclinations this granddaughter of Queen Victoria, formerly Princess Alix of Hesse, is more German and English than Blay. There was a time when her foreign habits of thought and sympathies were so apparent that she was not popular among the Russians, who are intensely nationalised and distrustful of all things foreign. This unpopularity has almost wholly disappeared, however, owing to the sweet and kindly disposition of the Cuarina and her conscientious efforts to live up to the duties

There are feer daughters in the Czar's family, whose bright faces are familiar to the people of St. Petersburg, through the streets of which they are driven daily for every glimpse of sunshine. Notwithstanding the fact that they are grand duchesses, they are even more democratic than their parents and sed end smile at the passersby until corrected and scated by their nurses.



BY TROLLEY UP VESUVIUS. The FREE Homeste Tenrists May New Reach the Crater Without the Laber of Climbing. . Modernism has made no more remerkable stride of late years than eround the famous voicane which once

secured the famous voicence with the cities and lava upon the cities of Posspell and Berculaneum. new electric fallway sas seen leted by which the traveler can now reach the smoking crater of Vesuvius in a comfortable car. The new line starts from Pagliano at the base of the volcano and within a short distance of the shore of the Bay of Naples. The trip from Naples itself can be accomplished in an electric tram car and the old cable railway up the cone has itself been electrified so that practically the whole journey from Naples

to the cone can now be made by electric propulaton. The new railway has been constructed by the world famous firm of Sook. who have worked the cable railway up the cone for the past fifteen years. The total length of the railway is just over four and one-half miles. It is built up of three sections, the first and third. of which have ordinary smooth rails, the second section having an additional cog rail. The first section of the railway passes through a lovely vineelad sone on which are grown the grapes which makes the famous Lecrima Christi" wine. The houses are gradually left behind as one approaches the second section. This section is the steepest part of the journey,
