

#### ANCIENT SIGNALING.

The Mothod Invented by the Greein

The ancient Greeks and Romans practiced telegraphy with the help of pots filled with straw, and twigs saturated in oil, which, being placed in rows, expressed certain letters according to the order in which they were lighted. But the only one of their contrivances that merits a detailed description was that invented by a Grecian general named Æneas, who flourished in the time of Aristotle, intended for communication between the generals of an army.

It consisted of two exactly similar earthen ressels filled with water, each provided with a cock that would discharge an equal quantity of water in a given time, so that the whole or any part of the contents would escape in precisely the same period from both

On the surface of each floated a piece of cork supporting an upright marked into divisions, each division having certain sentence inscribed upon it. One of the vessels was placed at each station, and when either party desired to communicate he lighted a torch, which he held aloft until the others did the same, as a sign that he was all at-

On the sender of the message lowering or extinguishing his torch each party immediately opened the cork of his vessel and so left it until the sender relighted his torch, when it was at

pace closed. The receiver then read the sentence on the division of the upright that was level with the mouth of the vessel and which, if everything had been executed with exactness, corresponded with thatof the sender and conveyed the desired information.—Spare Moments.

WEDNESDAY marked the 128th anni versary of the adoption of the American Flag, June 14, 1777. The making of the model of this beautiful emblem of the home of the free and land of the brave was committed to the care of BETSY Russ. The pattern submitted to her had

upon it a six-pointed star. With unerring feminine sagacity so the pleasing narrative records, she said that, since the stars were to be placed in a circle, "They will have to be put on always with much care, as they must be perfectly straight to look well, while a five-pointed star looks well any way it is placed." This flag, with its thirteen stripes, alternate red and white, one for each State, with thirteen stars in a blue field, was adopted by Congress June 14, 1777.

In 1818, the number of States having ingreased to twenty, Congress enacted that the number of stripes be fixed at thirteen, the number of stars twenty, one star to be added on the admission of each new State, and that such addition should take effect on the Fourth of July next succeeding such admission. The symbolism of the National ensign was beautifully described by Washington in these words:

"We take the star from heaven, the red from our mother country, separating it by white stripes thus showing that we have separated from her, and the white stripes shall go down to posterity representing
