Upon the death of my said brother William Weigle, ^{and his said wife Eliza Weigle} the said premises shall vest absolutely in their two sons Albert ^{Weigle} and Theodore Weigle, their heirs and assigns forever, as tenants in common. In case of the death of either of said sons before the termination of said life estate, the said premises shall vest in the surviving son of the said William and Eliza Weigle, his heirs and assigns forever.

I give and bequeath unto Minnie O'Brien, wife of George O'Brien, of Youngstown, and State of Ohio, the sum of One thousand dollars and also my gold watch and chain and pair of bracelets, one consisting of five amethysts and the other of three diamonds and five sapphires, and my ring consisting of an amethyst surrounded with diamonds. I give, devise and bequeath unto Dora Emeline Weigle of the City of Philadelphia, daughter of George and Minnie Weigle her heirs and assigns forever, premises No. 559 North Fifteenth Street, in the City of Philadelphia, together with all of its furnishings and contents. I also give and bequeath unto her, the said Dora Emeline Weigle, my Russian Sable set and a bracelet consisting of ten diamonds and five rubies. I give and bequeath unto Sophia M. Baker my gold locket and oriental necklace. I give and bequeath unto Catharine Conover, daughter of said Dora Emeline ^{Weigle} the sum of Five hundred Dollars. In case of the death of the said Catharine Conover, in my lifetime I direct that said legacy shall lapse and become a part of my residuary estate. I give and bequeath unto George Conover, son of said Dora Emeline Weigle, the sum of Five hundred Dollars. In case of the death of the said George Conover, in my lifetime, I direct the said legacy shall lapse and become a part of my residuary estate. I give and bequeath unto Eliza ^{Weigle} Weigle, wife of my brother William Weigle my princess ring. In case of the death of said Eliza ^{Weigle} in my lifetime, I direct that said legacy shall lapse and become a part of my residuary estate.

I give and bequeath unto my brother William Weigle my Diamond Solitaire Ring. In case of the death of the said William Weigle in my life, ^{time} I direct the said legacy shall lapse and become a part of my residuary estate. I give, devise and bequeath unto my sister Catharine Mary Stanton, wife of William A. Stanton, of the City of Philadelphia, premises known as Number thirteen hundred and eighty (1308) Master Street, in the City of Philadelphia in fee simple together with all the goods chattels and personal property therein contained, excepting only such goods, chattels and personal property as are herein specifically devised and bequeathed. I give and bequeath unto the said Catharine, Mary Stanton, my emerald and diamond ring, my three stone diamond ring, my Solitaire Diamond earrings, my three diamond bar pins my cluster diamond brooch, containing fourteen stones and the diamond heart presented by the said Catharine Mary Stanton to me. All the rest, residue and remainder of my estate, real and personal and wheresoever the same may be, including my automobile, moneys on deposit and in kind and all other property not hereinabove devised and bequeathed shall be sold by my Executors hereinafter named, and the proceeds, after payment of all legacies, debts, lawful charges, costs of administration and all collateral inheritance and other taxes shall be distributed in equal shares between and among Catharine Mary Stanton, wife of William A. Stanton, and my brother

William Weigle, their and each of their executors, administrators and assigns forever. ^{I authorize and empower my Executors, hereinafter named to see and dispose of any or all of my property real and personal, and not hereinabove specifically devised or bequeathed either at public or private sale for such price or prices, as to them shall seem proper and to make, execute and deliver proper acquittances, deeds or deeds of conveyance, without liability on the part of the purchaser or purchasers thereof to see to the application, non-application}

or misapplication of the purchase money or proceeds of such sales. I direct that this power of sale shall apply to any and all real estate situate in other states than the state of Pennsylvania, as well as to real estate situate in Pennsylvania. I also direct that in the event of the death of Catharine Mary Stanton, in my lifetime that all devises and bequests to her shall lapse and become a part of my residuary estate. I nominate, constitute and appoint my sister Catharine Mary Stanton, wife of William A. Stanton and the Girard Trust Company to be the Executors of this my last will and Testament and also Guardians of such minor children as benefit under this Will. In case of the death of said Catharine Mary Stanton, I direct that the Girard Trust Company shall act as sole Executor.
