A HINT ON HYACINTH CULTURE. - A correspondent of the Country Gentleman gives the following account of an experiment, which the English Garden commends as worthy of a trial :- '

"I procured a large, coarse sponge, such as coachmon use in washing carriages, and making a number of incisions about 3 inches deep and 2 lone, with a sharp knife, in the top, I inserted the bulbs in the openings, which, in consequence of the clastic nature of the sponge, closed over them, permitting only the points to appear above the surface. They were arranged in two concentric circles around a fine large fellow in the centre, numbering fifteen in all. I then placed the whole thing in the top of a largo vase, capable of holding nearly twogallens, and filled the vaso by pouring water through the sponge until about one-half of the sponge was below the surface of the water, and the other part above. The water was slightly warmed, necessary in striking outlings and otherwise foreing vegetation; and being kept in a warm room, it was not allowed to become cold. In two or three days the hulbs began to shoot their bright green spires upward, giving promise or success. and in two or three weeks they were 5 or binches, high. About this time, in

order to hide the unsightly appearance of the sponge, I scattered a few thimblefuls of rape seed over the surface, be-tween the bulbs, which sprang up almost -immediately, and covered it entirely with a fine moss like mantle, adding greatly to

the beauty of the experiment.

SALT FOR PEAR TREES. - Salting round pear trees to prevent the blight is becoming a general practice in Central New York. From 400 to 600 pounds to the acre are regularly applied each year, with satisfactory results. A correspondent of The Small Fruit Recorder writes as tollows on this subject: "Last spring I put a small shovelful of the refuse material from the salt works-which is composed, I believe, of salt, lime, and ash—around a four-year-old pear tree. It has made a very thrifty-growth, and the leaves are all free from blight-or-spot, and have a very glossy, healthy look; while others of the same lot, manared with barnyard manure, have grown but little, and the foliage is spotted and dull.
