Work is progressing with renewed vigor at Fairmount Park, with a view to its readiness for the grand Centennial gathering. This, by the way, is one of the chief ornaments and attractions of our city. Though originally established to prevent the erection of such factories on the Schuylkill as would render the water unfit for drinking purposes, it has grown by purchase and donation, from a comparatively small tract, until it embraces three thousand acres, and takes the first rank among the parks of the world. WORTH CONSIDERING.

In 1874 the total assessments amounted to \$548,243,535, and the city tax rate \$2.20, the State tax having been abolished in 1860 the city's expriditures were in the neighborhood of \$5,000,000. The Connecticut Election.

The wag of the political pendulum has made Connecticut a Democratic State again. The Republican defeat is of-that comfortable kind which is so decisive that all anxiety is at once allayed and no coroner's inquest is necessary. The sum total is that the Democrats have carried the State ticket and a majority on joint-ballot in the Legislature, which secures and Democratio U. S. Senator, vice Buck ingham, Republican. This is history repeating itself. A Connecticat Spring election has determined by the state of the roads and weather, this year both excellent; by the unity of division of the New Haven Democrats, this time they were eplit; by the number of Prohibition ist Republicans who drink water and vote Democratic regularly, as one Old Whigs used to be defined as men who drank regularly and voted the Domocratic ticket occasionally; somewhat and very little by the political principles involved in the contest. 
