Among other obstacles that we have been compalled to contend with in the past was the false impression on the public mind that we were a labor organization, or trades union, organized to-wage war upon capital. This, I am happy to say is being rapidly overcome. Capitalists, manufacturers and employers generally, have discovered that, as an organiza-tion, we are just the opposite: They find that our membership is composed of men in all ranks of life. The laborer and capitalist, the mechanic and manufacturer, the farmer and professional man, are here united together in one common cause, and striving to attain one common object.

The teachings of our Order serve to harmonize all conflicting interests, and we are at all times prepared to accord to every one his rights as guaranteed by the Con-stitution of the United States.

Much of the prejudice formerly exist ing against us as an organization is rapidly disappearing, and this happy result is in the main attributable to the influence of the press. During the past few years a number of publications have been issued in our interest. The National and State Councils have recognized their influence, making the necessary appropriations to enable the officers to scatter these publications broadcast. He believes that the predominance of tubercular disease in nothern latitudes is not due to a tendency in the climate itself to produce this condition, but to the greater liability to hudding together for purposes of warmth, although it is probable that a diseased condition or irritation of the lungs in such cases increases the morbifica-tion of the poisonous material. Where, in consequence of the mildness of the climate persons are induced to live a great deal out-of-doors, or where the houses are not closed up to such a degree as to exclude the external air, or prevent its free passage, this disease becomes comparitively unknown. Hu, indeed, encourages apan windows and draughts of air, especially at night, if the body be well covered. - Harper's Mag. for December.
