certain limits of the Town of Hammonton,"
with the name of the person or
persons making the bid, will be received
by the Board of Health, at their office in
the Trust Company's parlor, at 8 o'clock
on Tuesday evening, Dec. 21st, 1900,
during a session of said Board.
The work to be done under the above
title, by which bids will be tested, is the
cutting and removal of all garbage,
solid or liquid, during the month of July
and August, twice a week during April, May, June,
September, October, once a week during
November, December, January,
February and March. Garbage district
to be bounded as follows: From Street
to Maple Street, Fourth Street to Grand
Street, including both sides of the boundary
line.

All garbage to be removed in water-
tight covered wagons or carts. Con-
tractors will be required to furnish a
bond in the amount of \$250 for the satis-
fying performance of his duties. Bids
must state where bidders would dispose
of all garbage collected. The Board of
Health reserves the right to reject any
or all bids if it shall deem it for the pub-





TUBERCULOSIS.

Tuberculosis is a disease caused by living germs flying in the atmosphere.

It is caused, first, by sputum carelessly thrown from the mouths of people, and dropped at improper places, only to be dried by the sun and turned to germs. Second, by dingy rooms where the owners hardly ever open the windows. Third, by many people sleeping in the same room.

To prevent Tuberculosis, keep the windows open in all bedrooms day and night. Avoid dark, damp, hot and dusty rooms. Breathe only through your nose. One should get as much sunshine as possible, and have plenty of exercise each day. Loose clothing is needed, and wear light underclothes. Avoid wet clothing or move about quickly until you can change them. Eat good food, such as bread, cereals, milk, butter, eggs, meat, vegetables and fruit. Avoid fried food, candy, rich cake, and raw food. Don't stoop, throw back the chest and shoulders, and breathe deeply. Keep your rooms clean. Chew your food before swallowing. Drink water freely and drink no liquors. Keep clean; wash your face and hands in the morning when you get up, and before you go to bed in the evening. Take a bath every morning with cool water, because warm water will weaken the body; rub quickly and thoroughly dry. Clean your teeth before and after every meal. Never hold pins or money in your mouth, because they are liable to give you consumption, or you may swallow them.

If you have consumption, do not be afraid of the cold, for that is what cures you, mostly; and do five things.—first, send for the doctor; second, have plenty of sunshine; third, plenty of fresh air; fourth, good food and rest. Sleep out of doors, and do not talk loudly.




