American masons earn \$13.79 a week and English musous only \$9.84. Chairmakers average \$11 a week in America and \$8.75 in England. Ordinary dress makers are rated as carning \$7.43 per week in the United States against \$4 to \$6 in Great Britain. There are but a few of the



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
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
