Concerning License.

EDITOR REPUBLICAN: In listening to Mrs. Parcells, Sunday evening, we wondered what were the thoughts of those present who were so lax in their duty as to allow a licensed saloon in Hammonton.

It is well known that if the anti-saloon element had voted as it talked, there would have been no licensed whiskey mill in town. The facts are that the talkers lack the moral courage to come out flat-footed for the cause they pretend to represent.

Suppose the temperance people should decide to boycott those who are responsible for the presence of the saloon in Hammonton, whether it be the butcher, the baker, or candlestick maker.

I think if the W. C. T. U. had at first sent out a warning that they would boycott every one who in any way was known to favor the sale of liquor here in town, the condition would have been different from what it is to-day. It might have caused some little inconvenience at first, but I firmly believe great good would have been brought about by such a resolution, and possibly have prevented some from filling drunkards' graves.

Some may say, "Oh, that won't do, for there are so many of our business men in favor of the saloon, and some of them contribute generously toward the Church." While Mr. So-and-so does not belong to the Church, his wife does, and if we boycott him we fear his wife may not feel like helping us out in our next entertainment.

I believe that if those people who have been preaching, praying, groaning in the cause of temperance had just climbed up on the band-wagon, so to speak, and paraded the streets shouting their battle-cry, and let the town know they were honest in their intentions, Hammonton would be "dry" to-day.

It may not be too late now. Who has the courage to organize a boycott party?

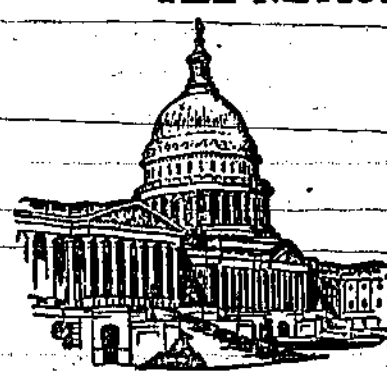

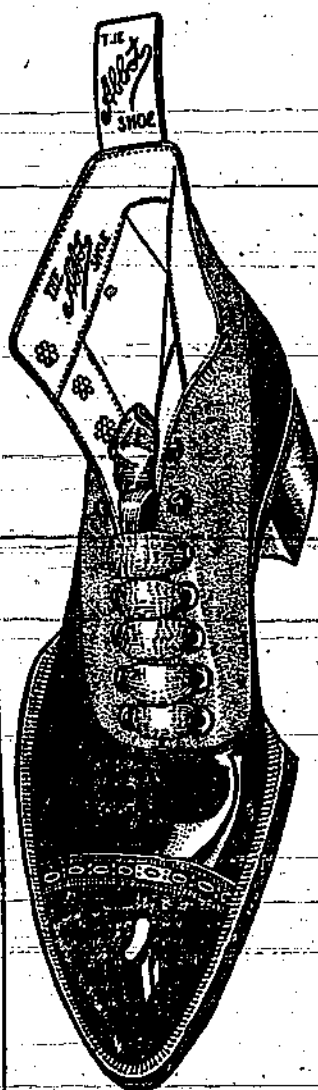

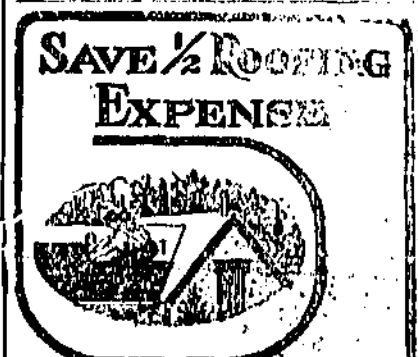
