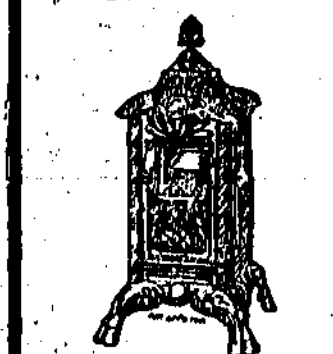

We doubt whether many can remember better skating than the Hammontron young people (and some older ones) had during holiday week, on Hammontron Lake. The ice was strong, variously estimated from four to nine inches, — quite smooth, and with very few dangerous spots. Last Saturday saw a merry crowd, nearly a hundred, enjoying "snap-the-whip," "hockey," and plain and fancy skating. And all were sorry that the mid-week brought summer weather and spoiled their rare sport.

Quite a little confusion is caused by the giving of similar first names in families of the same surname. For instance, in three Italian families whose name begins with T, there are three Marys, and their teacher has to label them—one, two and three. The American families seem to have a greater variety of names. Our esteemed townsman, Placido Luca, finds his name too common, for the reason given above, and has applied to the Court for permission to change it to Lucas.

Council's well meant rule that no sign shall be placed between the building line and the curb, has put John Helzer in an embarrassing position. He has two barber-poles, one at the curb and the other a little in, near the brick walk. The latter must be removed, but where to? He can place it on the building line, but that would be in the center of the walk, as laid. Our advice is to place it against the building, out of the way of pedestrians, and will be seen quite as readily.

Thanks to the Commuters' Association, a victory was recently won over the combined Railroad Companies, but this may be short-lived unless the people are successful at next Tuesday's hearing, at Trenton. AN ORDINANCE requiring persons owning property, including lots, streets or streets through which any sewer or drain forming a part of the system of sewers constructed in the Town of Hammonton, to connect with and use said system of sewers, and deposit therein the sewer from such property or properties.

Whereas, there has been constructed and there is now in operation a system of sewers in said Town of Hammonton; and Whereas, it is Ordained, by the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Hammonton: Section 1. That all persons owning property fronting on Bellevue Avenue from East Street to Main Road; Orchard Street from Third Street to Madison Avenue; Pleasant Street from Packard Street to Washington Street; Fresh Street from Third Street to Second Street; Strat Street from Tilton Street to Egg Harbor Road; Somerby Street from Railroad Avenue to Washington Street; Tilton Street from Bellevue Avenue to Fresh Street; Third Street from Bellevue Avenue to Orchard Street; Horton Street from Bellevue Avenue to Pleasant Street; Second Street from Bellevue Avenue to Fresh Street; Egg Harbor Road from Bellevue Avenue to Orchard Street; Somerby Street; Thirteenth Street from Washington Street to Egg Harbor Road; Twelfth Street from Front Street to Grand St.; Washington Street from Orchard Street to Thirteenth Street; West End Avenue from Twelfth Street to Orchard Street; Grand St. from Twelfth Street to Orchard Street; Grape Street from Egg Harbor Road to Valley Ave.; Vine Street from Egg Harbor Road to School Lane; and School Lane from Beach Street from Egg Harbor Road to Central Avenue; Cherry Street from Egg Harbor Road to Third St.; Maple Street from Egg Harbor Road to Central Avenue; and Bellevue Avenue from Bellevue Avenue to Valley Avenue; Broadway from Central Avenue to Valley Avenue; Valley Avenue from Bellevue Avenue to Broadway; Third Street from Bellevue Avenue to Maple Street; Second Street from Bellevue Avenue to Cherry Street; Egg Harbor Road from Bellevue Avenue to Maple Street; Front St. from Twelfth Street to Pleasant Avenue; and Woodman Avenue in the Town of Hammonton, Atlantic County, New Jersey; being streets through which said sewer is constructed, shall, within the last date of adoption of this ordinance, connect with said sewer and use same to deposit therein the sewage from said properties.

Section 2. Notice of the adoption of this ordinance shall be given by the Town Clerk to the persons required herein to make connection with said sewer by mailing a copy of this ordinance to the last known post office address of said persons, within 30 days from the date of the adoption of this ordinance.

Section 3. Said sewer connections shall be made according to the rules and regulations prescribed by ordinance by said Town of Hammonton.

Section 4. Any person or persons, corporation or corporations who shall fail or refuse to make said sewer connection within the time limited by this ordinance shall, upon conviction, pay a penalty of Ten Dollars (\$10) and costs of prosecution.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

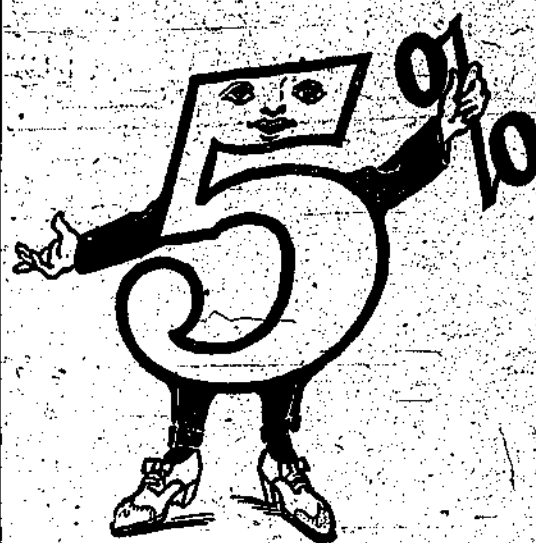
