Dr. Banks Replies to Bishop Potter.

Dr. Louis Albert Banks, as a prelude to a sermon in Grace M. E. Church, New York, replied to Bishop Potter and Dr. Rainesford, whose remarks on prohibition have caused considerable discussion among the clergy. He said in part:

"To say that prohibitionists are frauds is unworthy of a man of Bishop Potter's standing and calibre, for it is an assault on the Christian character of men who are as honest as he, and many of them as intelligent. To say that the prohibition principle is wrong is to attack Almighty God. And now comes Dr. Rainesford, with the startling declaration that 'the Woman's Christian Temperance Union is doing the Devil's work.' Here is an assault on the largest body of Christian women ever organized in the world. One would think that they would be spared the bitter denunciations of the Christian minister."

AN ORDINANCE to regulate the rate of speed of horseless vehicles, commonly called automobiles, in the streets of Hammonton.

Introduced November 30th, 1901. Passed December 26th, 1901.

Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Hammonton:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any horseless vehicle, commonly known as automobiles, propelled by steam, electricity, gas, or other motive power, to be driven through, on, or over any of the streets or roads in the Town of Hammonton at a greater rate of speed than ten miles per hour.

Section 2. That any person who shall be convicted of a violation of Section 1 of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of an offense and shall be subject to a fine of Ten Dollars or imprisonment for ten days for each and every violation thereof.

Section 3. That this Ordinance shall take effect immediately after its passage.

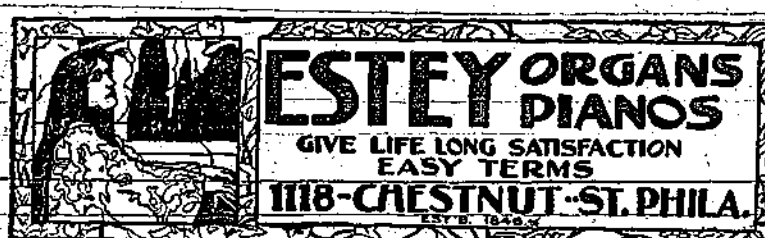
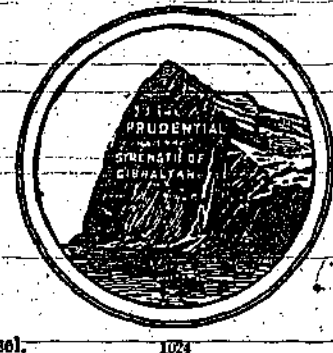

A Question Settled.

As we intimated last week, the
statute relating to the issuing of
bonds to provide public water-works
is so peculiarly worded that no one
seemed certain just what was intended.
Did the author mean that a
vote of a majority of all legal voters
registered in town was necessary to
authorize the bonds? or that a majority
of legal voters who voted at the election
held for the purpose was sufficient?
The wording would admit of either
interpretation, and Solicitor
Chandler was of the opinion that a
majority of all legal voters was
required; hence Town Council postponed
action in the matter until
more light could be obtained.

That light appears in the general
State Election Law, in Section 185,
which reads as follows, omitting
some of its profuse verbiage:

"185. When by the provisions of
any statute * * * the approval of a
majority of the legal voters of the
state or of any subdivision thereof is
required * * * before such statute
takes effect, or before any prescribed
action or proceeding under such
statute shall be valid or lawful, it is
hereby declared that the intent and
meaning in any such statute of the
words, legal voters, are persons en-
titled to vote, and do vote, at the
time and in the manner prescribed
in and by such statute upon the
question or proposition submitted;
and * * * the persons who do not
vote at such election shall not be
estimated, counted, or considered
for the purpose of ascertaining what
is a majority of the legal voters * * *
with respect to the proposition
submitted * * *"

There is nothing ambiguous in
that language, surely. It clears the
fog from the other statute, so that
no one can misunderstand it. The
Town Solicitor admits this, and will
reverse his first decision. One
member of Council said: "That
settles it, and the only thing for us
to do is to arrange for a special
election, as instructed by the voters
at the recent special town meeting."
A special meeting of Council was
held on Thursday evening, and the
result is given in another article.

It is perfectly right that only those
who are sufficiently interested in the
water question to vote for or against
it, should be counted. A man who
is too indifferent to take the trouble
to vote should not be counted on
either side.

Of course we don't know how the
voters will decide, but it is the legal
and fair way to proceed, give every
man a chance to express his opinion.

We believe a majority will approve
the issue of bonds and erection of
public water-works.

Special Election.

At a special meeting of Town
Council, held on Thursday evening,
a resolution was adopted, by unani-
mous vote, instructing the Clerk to
arrange for a special election, to be
held on Wednesday, January 29th,
1902, at which time all legal electors

in the Town of Hammonton are
requested to vote for or against a
proposition to bond the Town in a
sum not to exceed thirty thousand
dollars, to build and equip a public
water-works plant.

Council has done all it can do, so
far; it remains for the voters to
decide the matter, and we expect a
large majority of votes in favor of the
bonds.

It seems like a large amount to
expend; but it is a large undertak-
ing, and the result will justify the
expenditure. The Town must have
an ample water-supply, and the best
way to get it has, in our opinion,
been adopted.
