## The Nicaragua Ship Canal.

(As everybody is interested in this inter-  
oceanic canal project, we copy from the  
"Young People" the best article we have  
seen on the subject.)

Short cuts are the order of the day  
everywhere. Trunk railways are  
all the time studying to make their  
route shorter, so as to gain a few min-  
utes advantage over their competitors  
in point of time. "Right across" is  
the constant watchword. The great  
ocean steamers vie with each other in  
trying to shorten the time from contin-  
ent to continent.

For a good many years this country  
has been working upon the problem how  
to get from the Atlantic to the Pacific  
by water without going around by Cape  
Horn. Added interest has been given  
to this problem by the recent war with  
Spain. When the war began, of  
course the route around Cape Horn was  
our war

although this agreement was broken  
because the company did not fulfil its  
conditions, still, in 1857, it was re-  
newed in such a way that it could not  
be abrogated save upon the decision of  
arbitrators that have never yet been  
appointed.

Then England and the United States  
made the famous Clayton-Bulwer treaty  
in 1850, providing that "neither coun-  
try will ever obtain or maintain for  
itself any exclusive control over the said  
canal." That treaty is now in force.  
A great deal has been said about it  
first and last. Since the war with  
Spain began, however, there has been  
talk about an Anglo-American alliance.  
Should such an alliance be made upon  
the terms now proposed, the United  
States is to build the Nicaragua Canal  
and permit England to use it in time of  
war.

Perhaps it may seem as if there had  
been altogether too much talk and too  
little actual progress in the way of  
building this canal; but it must be re-  
membered that this is a great enter-  
prise, affecting the interests of all  
nations. It will not do to be in a  
hurry about such things.

You will be interested to know that  
in 1889 what was known as the Nica-  
ragua Canal Company began work at  
Greytown on the Mosquito route. The  
harbor of that city was dredged to a  
depth sufficient to admit ships of four-  
teen feet draft. Wharves and landing  
places and permanent buildings were  
built, and a line of railroad twelve miles  
long constructed and equipped. To do  
this, six million dollars were spent.  
But work soon stopped, and has been  
at a standstill ever since.

It was thought that the total cost of  
the canal would be one hundred million  
dollars, and that it would take six yrs.
