Attention is called to the large number of deaths during the months of February, March and April, among the children, numbering 31 in a total of 42 deaths during this period. The majority of these were due to the epidemic of measles and whosping cough. Pneumonia and other discares complicating these, due in many cases to carelessness on the part of parents in not giving the children proper attention at the onset of the discare. The above figures do not include a large number of deaths in the surrounding districts, the burlats in many cases being made here.

Communicable diseases reported were thirty, but one was reported by two physicians, at different times, making the true number 29.

BANITARY INSPRCTOR'S REPORT.

Every case of typical fever reported was traceable to poluted water,—none traceable to our town water.




