An Interesting Law Case.

Mrs. Frank S. Swift, of Hammonton, has just been notified by her attorneys, H. F. Stockwell, and E. G. C. Bleakley, of Camden, that Vice Chancellor Leaming has decided in her favor her suit for the recovery of an estate of forty thousand dollars. The case was tried at Camden the latter part of last December. It will be of interest to people of this locality, not only because the complainant resides here, but also because of the large amount of money and the principles of law involved.

It appears from the testimony, that Mrs. Swift's name was Mary A. Sloan, that her father was a surgeon in the United States Army, and prominent in St. Paul, Minn., which was then a frontier army post. Dr. Sloan died there in 1880, without a will, leaving an estate of a little over forty thousand dollars in cash and securities. He was survived by one child, the present Mrs. Swift, and her mother, Mary A. Sloan. Under the laws of Minnesota, this large estate under ordinary conditions would

have been distributed between the daughter and widow, in the proportions of two-thirds and one-third respectively; but the mother, Mrs. Sloan, and her daughter concluded that the mother should have a larger income during her life, and they therefore agreed between themselves that the mother should hold all of the forty thousand dollars during her life, and at her death all the estate should be the daughter's; and that during the life of Mrs. Sloan she would have two-thirds of the income and the daughter only one-third.

Under this trust agreement, Mrs. Sloan seems to have held the entire estate so long as she lived. She died in Hammonton in April, 1907, and all the property was then taken possession of by R. D. Craighead, a hotel proprietor of Atlantic City. This gentleman refused to acknowledge Mrs. Swift's claim to the forty thousand dollars, and the suit in the Court of Chancery resulted.

At the trial, Mr. Craighead produced a paper signed by Mrs. Sloan and Mrs. Swift, which he claimed gave all of the estate to Mrs. Sloan; that Mrs. Sloan then made a will, giving the estate to himself.

Messrs. Stockwell and Bleakly, on behalf of Mrs. Swift, contended however that she had no idea of the effect of this paper, and that she could not be bound by it because it was executed without proper advice as to its legal effect, and it was without consideration and void as between her trustee and herself, the cestui que trust. The Vice Chancellor upheld their contention in the following language:

"Defined principles of public policy are clearly opposed to the unrestricted right of a trustee to acquire the property of a cestui que trust. I am satisfied that when Mrs. Swift executed the revocation of the trust, and thereby in effect conveyed practically her entire estate to her mother, she had no definite knowledge of her mother's ultimate purpose, and no definite purpose of her own other than to comply with her mother's request. I think that the trust assets must be now treated as having been vested in the mother until her death, for the benefit of the complainant; and that complainant will now be entitled to an accounting from the defendant."

The defendant was represented by H. Cameron Hinkle, Esq. of Atlantic City, and Richard V. Landabury, Esq. of Newark.

It gives us pleasure to publish a true statement of this very interesting case, not only because one of our own citizens was plaintiff, but because of strangely incorrect stories published in Philadelphia and Atlantic City papers. Then, too, we feel gratified because one of our Hammonton boys, Henry F. Stockwell, was the attorney, and won his case though opposed by the ablest legal talent in the State.

Town-Council Meeting.

A special meeting was held on Thursday evening, with all members present. The Mayor stated that Mr. Ballard and himself, under the instructions of Council, had contracted for fifteen acres of land on Eleventh Street, from John A. Wenderoth; that ten acres of this land can be found in this region, the bed containing ten or more feet in depth and reaching to the surface, with virtually no covering of earth. For this they agreed to pay one hundred dollars per acre. The deed has been executed and only awaits a search of records to complete the purchase.

On motion, the action of Committee was approved, an order for fifteen hundred dollars voted, the cash to be paid after a complete and satisfactory search of title has been obtained.

Henry F. Blockwell's bill for services as Solicitor, plus cash paid for certain expenses, \$33.04 was ordered paid; also that of the Atlantic Real Estate and Investment Company, \$15, for services contracted for and performed.

The action of last Council, in ordering a survey, intended for grading streets and ultimate sewerage system, was unanimously endorsed.

On motion, a gas lamp was ordered on Railroad Avenue, near Pratt Street. The petition for extended lights on Main Road, Middle Road, etc., were discussed. Figures proved that two thousand dollars to our next tax roll, and the matter was dropped for the present.

To Observe Lincoln's Birthday.

Chairman Charles R.
